APPEAL TO WOMEN OF THE PROVINCE

Lady Hendrie Urges Food Conservation Thrift and Economy

The Organization of Resources Committee of the Province of Ontario has asked for the co-operation of the woman power of the Province in dealing with the all-important matters of Food Conservation, Thrift and Economy.
The food problem is of the utmost seriousness. The situation has been stated by our Food Controller to be desperate, and in the United States Mr. Hoover recently has said that it is not squarely faced, the whole world will soon be hungry, and that our civilization will have to meet the sternest menace with which it has yet been threatened.
To the end that Ontario women may do their full part in meeting the situation, a convention has been called in Toronto, when women from all parts of the province may be present to voice their determination and to state the contribution they can make to the solution of the problem.

As chairman of the Committee of Arrangements I take this opportunity to call upon Ontario women to regard this conference as a call to National Service.

The convention will be opened with a public meeting to be held July 23rd at 8 p.m. in Convocation Hall, University of Toronto. All are cordially invited to this meeting.

On the following day, July 24th, a conference will be held in Canadian Foresters Hall, Toronto. This conference will be attended by women delegates from all parts of the Province, whose duty will be to discuss practical problems, and to decide as to the formation of some organization for the purpose of dealing with most earnestly to impress upon all delegates the acuteness of the Food Crisis, and to urge that they shall make a very special effort to attend the convention.

Drawing For Army in U. S.

By Courier-Express Wire.
Washington, July 20.—Drawing for the army began at the Senate office building this morning in the presence of Secretary of War Baker, the Senate and House military committees, a group of high officials of the government and representatives of the press. It is estimated that ten to twelve hours will be required to draw all of the 150,000 members required to fix the order of liability of each of the ten million men registered.

About 40,000 of the new recruits will go to fill up the ranks of the regular army and a number will be assigned to the National Guard, which will be raised to war strength. The remainder—about 600,000—will be assembled in the national army, most of which is expected to be in training before mid-September.

As the numbers were called out by an official, who blindfolded, drew them from carefully sealed capsules, they were flashed over the wires of the various press associations to every part of the United States.

PRICE OF FISH MUST LOWER

Significant Statement By Hon. Mr. Hanna, Food Controller

TO EXERCISE POWERS
Committee May Assume Control of Actual Distribution of Fish

Toronto, July 20.—The initial meeting of the Government Food Controller's Fish Committee was held yesterday afternoon in the office of Hon. W. J. Hanna. Mr. Hanna himself was present, and also Mr. G. Frank Beer, who will be chairman of the Fish Committee, and Mr. F. S. Wiley, Mr. R. Y. Eaton, the third member of the committee, was unavoidably absent in Manitoba. At the conclusion of the conference Mr. Hanna issued a statement which revealed the extent of the authority and the measure of power invested in the members of the special fish committee. It is also announced that within a short time the consuming public in this and other parts of Canada, will see a material reduction in the price of fish. Mr. Hanna's statement was as follows:

"The question is being asked whether the Fish Committee will need to assume control of the actual distribution of fish. Such action may be necessary. It is hoped, however, that the interests concerned may adjust their methods to the requirements of the public. The price to the consumer must and will be lower."

The Fish Committee is now ascertaining the proportion of the fish supply which comes directly from the fishermen to the large retail distributors, and the proportion which goes from the fishermen to the so-called wholesale man and thence to the smaller retail dealers.

"I have vested in the members of the Fish Committee like powers to those vested in me by the order-in-council which appointed me Food Controller for Canada." The powers cited in the order-in-council and referred to by Mr. Hanna are very comprehensive and enable him to assume control of the supply of fish, to exercise the powers of the fish committee, to regulate the sale and delivery thereof, or the committee, if it desires, may requisition, store, sell and deliver fish.

It is the intention of the Fish Committee to keep the public informed of its work through official statements. These statements, however, will be issued only when there is real information to give.

DEATH BLOW DEALT TO GERMAN HOPES

Brilliant Successes of Brusiloff's Army Ring Knell To "Peace Cry"

INTRIGUERS CHECKED
Recent Disorders Last Stand of Enemies of Free Russia

London, July 20.—In the course of an editorial on the troubles of Russia the Times says: "The temporary withdrawal of Korniloff across the Lomina does not lessen the importance of the brilliant successes the armies under Brusiloff have lately achieved. They exercised a curious influence upon the internal politics of the country. On the one hand, the cadets or Constitutional Democrats appear to have rushed to the conclusion that this marked the end of the patriotic energy of the southern arm, and signified a general revulsion from the advanced revolutionary doctrines which had inspired the advocates of 'German peace' and paralyzed for a time the military force of the nation. On the other hand, the extremists and German reactionary agents, whose tools the extremists are, perceive these successes as both imperiling their position and thwarting the military plans and political intrigues of their German patrons. The cadets and Maximalists accordingly decided that now or never is the moment to upset the Provisional Government and its supporters the Council of Soldiers and Workmen's delegates. The action of the Maximalists is consistent with the principles they profess. Leine and his associates are declared enemies to order and uncompromising apostles of peace with annexation and indemnities as advocated in Berlin in the last issue of the ambiguous formula, 'a striking message to the Russian people, Roosevelt, Hughes, Wickersham and other eminent Americans expose its character and its purpose in the name of the American Rights League demonstrate again the incompatibility of any Leine peace with the fundamental principles of true democracy. The reasoning of the American League will not affect the paid emissaries of Germany or the fanatical extremists, but it will be well calculated to impress the multitude of Russians, who believe in American freedom, and who have confidence in the good will and sincerity of American statements."

essay that closer touch should be established between the great parties and the government. I am ready, so far as is possible without impairing the federal character and constitutional basis of the empire to do everything possible to impart to this co-operation more life and efficiency. "I also consider it desirable that the relations of confidence between parliament and the government should be made closer by calling to the leading executive positions, men, who in addition to their conciliatory character, possess the confidence of the great parties in the popular representative body. All this is, of course, possible only on the assumption that the other side recognizes that the constitutional right of the imperial administration to conduct our policy must not be narrowed. I am not willing to permit the conduct of affairs to be taken from my hands. We are sailing through a wildly tossing sea, in a dangerous channel, but our destination shines out before our eyes."

"What we long to attain," the chancellor went on, "is a new and splendid Germany, not a Germany which wishes, as our enemies believe, to terrorize the world with her armed might; but the morally purified, God-fearing, loyal, peaceful and mighty Germany which we all love. For this Germany we shall fight and endure. For this Germany we shall fight our way through, despite all force."

In referring to the military situation on the various fronts, Chancellor Michaelis said: "The season of the year has set a pause to the fighting in the Caucasus, Persia and Palestine. When it is resumed the enemy will find the Turkish army newly equipped and full of confidence."

With relatively small numbers it carried out an astonishing exploit. Within three days it has broken the lines of the Third Austrian Army under General Nadas along a front of 12 miles, forced the Dniester, captured the historic city of Halicz, advanced 15 miles, and has taken 100,000 prisoners 170 German officers and a hundred guns. Of the enemy's troops the Austrian fifteenth division lost four-fifths, the German 93rd and Austrian 36th divisions lost half their effectives. Out of 44 battalions of 32,000 bayonets there remain not more than 18,000. Our losses were about a third of these. regard that Archduke Joseph believed Korniloff's offensive was not serious, but the enemy is now thoroughly alarmed and offering desperate resistance, Kaluz having changed hands three times in 24 hours.

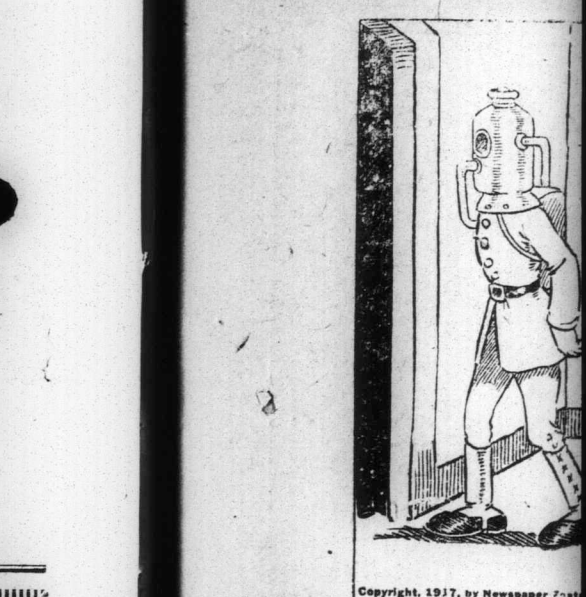
