OBITUARY.

MISS JEAN E. GRIERSON
(From Yarmouth Herald)

Many persons throughout Yarmouth town and county were much grieved when it was learned that Miss Jean Elizabeth Grierson, the much beloved and highly esteemed teacher of the primary department of the South End school, had passed away at the Yarmouth hospital. Miss Grierson had been in poor health for some time, but by her great determination and love for her work among the young, continued at her school until five months ago, when she was taken seriously ill and was ever since confined to her home until about four weeks ago, when her physicians advised her removal to the hospital. Her condition was such, however, that little could be done for her and during the past few days, although she held out a most buoyant spirit for resuming her work amongst the young, those nearest to her realized that the end was approaching and she passed away as stated.

Miss Grierson was born in New York and was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Grierson, natives of Kirkpatrick, Durham, Kirendbrightshire, Scotland, who came to America and located in that city in 1852. Mr. Grierson was an architect and builder by profession and in 1862 he removed with his family to Kentville, where he resided until his death. During his residence there he was superintendent of the car department of the W. & A. Railway and later the D. A. R. Miss Grierson was the third daughter and took up studies and fitted herself for a teacher early in life, and in 1883 came to Yarmouth County and located at Tusket, where for five years she was a teacher in that village. In 1889 she came to Yarmouth to take charge of the primary department of the South End school and ever since that time she has done much in shaping the destinies of many of the young of our town. Her love for the work amongst the young had no bounds. Being of a most philanthropic spirit her whole life was given to their welfare and comfort, and only a very few persons fully know just how much Miss Grierson did in their behalf. Particularly was she watchful of the poor and needy ones of her school and times without number, have the little ones during the extreme cold winter weather been made warm, dry and comfortable, enabling them to pass in enjoyment what otherwise would have been a cold, distressing season. Her work with the children in the schools was also done in such an easy, kindly manner that even the very youngest developed an affectionate regard for her, and those who, unfortunately, could not grasp the simple teachings of the department as readily as others, were never slighted, but on the other hand had her greatest attention, so in that respect, as well as many others, her passing away will be deeply deplored.

Miss Grierson, through her long career amongst the young, developed and has, from time to time, put into vogue many new and useful methods for the tuition of the young children, all of which had always received the highest commendation and support of the school principals, inspectors and other authorities. Her services to the Yarmouth schools was, without an exception, determined and conscientious, and she always held the highest respect of her many associates on the teaching staff. This was most plainly evidenced in 1914, when she passed the twenty-fifth anniversary of entering the town's employ, and was most fittingly remembered by the teachers and others of the schools. She is survived by two sisters: Mrs. W. S. Uhlman, Carleton, Yarmouth Co., Miss Kearen, of Kentville, and one brother, Judge Grierson, of Weymouth.

A service was held at the residence of Mrs. William Law, Yarmouth North, and was conducted by Rev. Dr. Hill, assisted by Rev. Dr. Bambrick. The remains accompanied by Mrs. Law, with whom she had always made her home, and Judge Grierson, was sent to Kentville Wednesday morning for interment.

The funeral at Kentville was held on Thursday 13th, at 3 o'clock from her former home. Burial at the Oakes
