GRAVEL FOR ROADS.—Our roads in Kentville, appear in spite of all the money expended on them from year to year, gradually becoming rougher and worse and worse. The quality of the material sold on this result, is largely conclusive to this. We went out on Christmas day, with Mr. Watson Bishop, on the Canadian road to look at a strata of soil, said to be of first quality for road making. We found the spot, at about a mile from Kentville, on the road beyond Mr. Andrew Woods'. The soil appeared to be a stony, gravelly kind, and beats up into almost a solid rock, by constant travel upon it, making a dry, hard, and almost impenetrable road. We would recommend it to our road makers, if we could only have a small part of our streets covered each year, we would soon have them in first class condition, and not a drop of water would stay on them to make mud.

MORDE.—There are few prettier spots along the Bay of Fundy shore than that where the village of Morde is located. This village formerly known as "French Cross" was once the seat of a very considerable trade, and some shipping is still done from there every summer, but the large number of vacant buildings, show that its glory has to a considerable extent departed and give it the appearance of a deserted village. A neat and commodious Episcopal church, a school house, post office and Custom house, are the public buildings of the village. Mr. Balcom the postmaster was formerly one of the leading business men of the county and although now at an advanced age, still retains his mental faculties to a surprising degree. Mr. John O'pin, the Custom House Officer, though an aged man still retains no considerable portion of the great strength for which he was once so celebrated. Morde, has always been a favorite resort for summer "glanciers" and pleasure seekers generally, and only requires to be known to become a summer home for foreign visitors. There is a fortune in store for some person of capital and enterprise who will invest in this village and advertise it as a seaside resort.

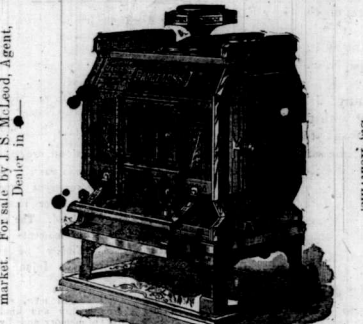
