FAST RUNS.

Reported on the Daily Trip of Trains in Great Britain.

The Great Western Railway Company's new express train from London to Bristol, which is scheduled to cover the distance between Paddington and Bath, at the rate of sixty miles an hour, yesterday made its first run, and succeeded in running from Paddington to Bath, a distance of 107 miles, in 103 minutes, or at the rate of 61.14 miles an hour, says the London Express, just received.

At Bath the train stopped up and slipped a carriage, and then continuing its journey to Bristol, according to time-table. This daily run, if regularly maintained at the rate of sixty miles an hour, will take its place at the head of the railway records for regular long-distance runs. Faster long-distance runs have been recorded—on June 14th, this year, the Great Western Railway Company carried the Prince of Wales from Paddington to Plymouth, a distance of 245 5/8 miles, in 237 1/2 minutes, or at the rate of 63 miles an hour.

But even this record is not quite equal to that which the West Coast try from London to Aberdeen achieved on two occasions, when it ran 640 miles in 512 minutes, or at an average rate of 63 1/4 miles an hour all the way, with a section from Preston to Carlisle, 90 miles in 79 minutes—probably the best long-distance run ever made.

Man Who Struck the King. The Earl of Wemyss, who, though an octogenarian, is one of the most fiery members of the Upper House, may boast of being the only man who has ever struck the King in public. It occurred when His Majesty was Prince of Wales, and in the House of Lords during a debate. The Prince, as Duke of Cornwall, attended, and sat immediately before Lord Wemyss. The noble lord made a speech, during which he, as usual, became heated, and, in the course of a gesture, brought his fist down bang on His Royal Highness' hat. The Prince, apparently not devoted to the argument, retired to a place further from him. Lord Wemyss was well known, before, succeeding to earldom, as Lord Etocho, an enthusiast of volunteering and rifle shooting.—Pearson's Weekly.

The Sons of Garibaldi. Italian journals recently announced that Ricciotti Garibaldi, the younger son of the eminent warrior, was planning an extensive trip of exploration in Patagonia. His brother, Menotti, who died the other day, took little interest in politics, although he accepted the place of a deputy for a time, soon resigned and devoted himself to agriculture in the Campagna Romana. His relations with the royal family were pleasant, and he is even said to have received financial aid from that source. His death recalls the fact that in 1840, a few months before he was born his mother followed her husband into the midst of a battle, and fought her way, revolver in hand, until her horse was shot. She was captured, but managed to escape three days later.

Italy's Ambition. Americans must not think that they are in all departments at the head of electrical progress. To say nothing of Marconi's achievements, Italy is far in advance of the United States in the introduction of the electrical traction, in place of steam, upon long sections of important railway lines. The line of the Adriatic company between Leco, on Lake Como, and Sondrio, 67 miles in length, is operated by electricity, and passenger trains traverse it at the rate of more than 40 miles an hour. A different system is in use on the line of the Mediterranean company, from Milan to Puerto Ceresio, on Lake Lugano, 45 miles, where a speed of 50 miles an hour is attained by trains consisting of a motor car and three passenger carriages.—Buffalo Commercial.
