COST CAME HIGH. SUNDAY SERVICES

The City Paid \$1.50 Per Square Yard for its Macadam

When Contractors Offered to do the Work For \$1.49—Matters Before the Finance Committee.

The finance committee met yesterday afternoon. There were present Chairman Stephens, Mayor Smith and Ald. Scane. The account of W. R. Baxter for \$24, referred to the committee, was recommended to be paid. The letter from Wm. Gray & Sons in regard to their factory and change of location was then taken up. A letter was also read from R. Harmer, one of the stockholders, who advised that the factory had moved to Toronto. Mr. Stephens read this letter.

Ald. Scane—I hardly think that Mr. Gray's letter is definite enough. I think that the clerk should write and find out just what the firm wants the council to do.

This course of action was agreed to. On motion it was decided to recommend that a resolution be passed by the council authorizing the Mayor to sign the lease to the firm.

The chairman was instructed to see the city solicitor and learn if the city could issue debentures on the water works mains. There have been a large number of mains laid since the issue of debentures. The waterworks department are paying for the additions from the water rates. They are permanent improvements and in the opinion of the finance committee, should be paid for by debentures.

A petition was read from the ratepayers on Wellington street asking for a rebate since this pavement was laid at a cost of \$1.50 per square yard when contractors offered to put it down at \$1.09 per square yard. The petition was signed by the S. Hadley Lunel, Co., Wm. Gray & Sons, Alex. Jamieson, John Glassford, Mr. Connors and Wm. Carswell.

Ald. Scane—Wm. Blight agreed to lay the pavement for \$1.09 per square yard but the city decided to do it themselves in order to experiment on the cost and it required \$1.50 per square yard when the municipality did the work. I think the ratepayers should be given some relief.

The chairman was instructed to see the solicitor and get his opinion. No action was recommended in regard to D. R. McGarvie's request for remission of taxes on his houses on Colborne street, condemned by the board of health.
