VIEWS OF CANADA.

People at the fair who visited the art gallery and admired the paintings also took time to inspect the views of Canadian scenery, which was most artistically arranged on the stairway leading to the first gallery on the south side of the main building. The most attractive display was made by the Grand Trunk Railway Systems and in every case illustrated scenes along the route of that popular road for tourists and travellers. Strangers who sisted the exhibition had in a few minutes unfolded to their astonished gaze a series of actual photographs typical of the varied and delightful scenery in Canada ranging from the babbling brook and trout steams, to the wild, ragged, yet majestic beauty of Muskoka. The very name Muskoka is one so well known, even to people who have never-set foot in that territory, that is at once brings up visions of an ideal summer resort, and fishing excursions that rival the most noted European resorts.

The scenes of beauty-spots in Muskoka, Lake of Bays district, and eround Kawartha lakes were simply fascinating, and suggested a country almost Utopian for the sportsman or the lover of nature. The views taken along the coast of Maine and in the Eastern States were also worthy of note. What probably, appeared most strongly to the tourist were the snap-shots of the "Highlands of Ontario," depicting pretty summer homes, facing streams that the angler at once pronounced the homes of speckled beauties; placid waters, on the

at once pronounced the home of spec-kled beauties; placid waters, on the shores of which comfortable looking summer cottages are located, ideal places in which to spend the hot sum-

one of the most striking views in the collection was one of the celebrated Shadow river, the shadow of the cance and its occupants being reflected in the smooth water so perfectly that it is really difficult to detect the difference between the shadow and the river. The arrival of the steamer at Muskoka Wharf is very realistic, and more eloquent in proclaiming the attractive features of this summer resort than columns of literature. The wharf is packed with a holiday crowd, while stretched along the wharf are the carcasses of a couple of score of deer, which have been brought down by the hunter's deadly rifle. Fisherman's luck in Muskoka is different from what is generally conveyed by the term, as the photographs of a number of splendid catches amply testify. In fact, life in Muskoka, a story without words, could be read by any person who could see.

Some of the views of the Kawartha Some of the News of the Kawartha lakes district were a prevelation even to Canadians, for it is only comparatively recently that this romantic district has been opened up to tourists, through the Grand Trunk Railway Company's aggressive policy of exploring our northern regions. They are located north of Peterboro and Lindsay, and combine scenery, wild and rugged, with here and there a landscape that might pass for an idealist's dream of summer land. Some of the scenes represented were: "A fikely Spot for Bass," "Running "A fikely Spot for Bass," Running the Rapids of Eel River," "View from Buckhorn Falls," "An Island Landing on Kawartha Lakes," and "A Portage at Eel River." The snapshot of the annual regatta on the Kawartha lakes, pictured very aptly one of the popular sports indulged in by visitors. "The Monarch and H.s. Herd" was probab'y one of the pictures which came in for the most general admiration. in for the most general admiration, it portrays a scene, once a comparatively common sight in the wilds of Canada, but now only met with in the Highlands of Ontario, the sportsman's paradise. 
