Measures will be submitted for the
aiding in the improvement of public
highways, for the encouragement of
the trade in dressed meat for the Eu-
ropean market, for abolishing tolls on
public highways and bridges, for fur-
ther encouraging technical education,
for consolidating the laws with re-
spect to public and high schools, and
re liquor licenses. The public ac-
counts and reports of the several de-
partments will be submitted to you
in due course. The estimates for the
current year are prepared with as
great economy as is consistent with
efficient service, and will at an early
date be placed before you.THE PROGRAM AT
OTTAWA FOR THE WEEKAddress to be Read To-Morrow—Only
The Speaker Chosen To-Day.Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The program of the
week, as laid out, is short. Sir Wil-
frid Laurier read for Sir Herbert Tupper
as senior Privy Councillor, and con-
ferred with him regarding the de-
tails of the opening. To-day, after the
election of the Speaker, the House will
adjourn.On Thursday the speech from the
throne will be read in the Senate, and
after retapping the Premier will an-
nounce to the Commons that on the
following day he will have ready a
joint resolution from both Houses to
them on the death of the Queen and
congratulations to King Edward upon
his accession.On Friday, after the resolution has
been adopted, the House will adjourn
until Monday, when the first order
of business will be the address.It is understood that, in the absence
of a leader on the Conservative side,
Sir Wilfrid Laurier will recognize Sir
Charles Herbert Tupper as senior
Privy Councillor.

CONSERVATIVE LEADERSHIP.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The Conservative
caucus last night met from 8 o'clock
until 11. At that hour W. R. Brock,
who acted as chairman, met the news-
paper men and made a statement,
which was very short and to the effect
that no question of policy was dis-
cussed, though the subject was mentioned.
The suggestion was adopted that this
should be left to a convention, which
will be called at a later date.

BLOOMFIELD.

Like the township of Raleigh,
of which it forms a part, Bloomfield is

called "Hardshipville." After clear-
ings were made and a better system
of cultivation prevailed, it became ap-
parent that the soil was unusually
rich. For three and one-half miles on
the north the Thames was the bound-
ary, which proved that its name ex-
pressed the opposite of what it was,
and so it was agreed by common con-
sent to call the place Bloomfield.The wheat here is in much better
condition than it was on Feb. 1st last
year. The fly seemed to make an ex-
ception of turkey red, some fine fields
of which were devoured bodily. A

THE EX-MAYOR.Mr. Stokes Thinks His Con-
stant Agitation Has MadeA Bad Root Sugar Factory Possible
Here—What He Has to Say.To The Planet.—Now that a great
best sugar industry is all but assured
to the farmers of Kent, and a big su-
gar factory to the city of Chatham,
I notice in the press a scramble
among several parties to have their
names prominently associated with
the introduction and initiation of this
great boom to the county and city. The
moment some quiet, plodding, disin-
terested person works up a scheme
to the point of undoubted financial
success, everybody seems to "have
known it all," and there is a rush to
get in at the front door of the stock
market. The millionaires of the
world are generally created by the
brains of obscure individuals who per-
sonally profit but little by being
ahead of their generation. Now as
a farmer of Kent county, and one
who expects to be greatly benefited by
this new industry, I want to see jus-
tice done to whom it is due in this
matter. If the farmers of the county
are enriched—as I am satisfied they
will be—a big impetus given to the
city of Chatham, of which there is
no doubt whatever, the credit is
largely due to ex-Mayor T. A. Smith,
the man whom the Liberals described
as having no business tact. The ex-
Mayor was the first to agitate this
matter two years ago, and bring it
before the council, and in other ways
made the subject familiar to the far-
mers of Kent. Mr. Smith never tired
preaching its benefits in the market
place and in the back concessions, un-
til at last the faith that was so strong
in himself was believed in and acted
upon. In saying so much for the ex-
Mayor there is not the slightest de-
sire to depreciate or belittle the enter-
prising energy of those spirited citi-
zens and others who have now taken
the "bull by the horns" to put Mr.
Smith's scheme into practical execu-
tion. It is all the more to the credit
of Mr. Smith that it is all a labor
of love with him, in the interest of
the public. While he has no personal
backpack to sharpen, or in fact any
stock in the new company, still he
is now off to Toronto to lay the
claims of this infant but giant-prom-
ising industry before the cabinet in his
own unique and persuasive manner,
and this, too, at his own personal ex-
pense. The farmers of Kent and the
citizens of Chatham are not likely to
forget the services of the ex-Mayor
in this matter as an spirited, patri-
