WILL MAKE MUCH CHANGE

The Chatham Gas Co. Will Spend \$25,000 in Modernizing their Plant.

At a meeting of the directors of the Chatham Gas and Electric Light Co., held on Wednesday afternoon last, it was determined to spend a large sum of money in modernizing the plant, and fully equipping it with machinery of sufficient capacity to answer the requirements of our city for many years. The sum to be expended will be about twenty-five thousand dollars, that will provide for two generating engines of the most modern make, and two large gas engines to operate the electric light plant. A handsome building will be erected for the electric lighting service and new offices will be erected suitable for a rapidly growing and successfully operated business.

During the past two years the consumption of gas and the rapidly increasing number of subscribers to the electric light service has taxed the capacity of the works to the utmost limit, but upon the installation of the new machinery our citizens are getting a service equal to any in Canada or elsewhere.

MANITOBA FLOUR.

Toronto, May 30.—The British Admiralty has decided to use Manitoba flour in the navy. This has been decided after a series of experiments which have been carried on for some time, with a view to ascertaining what flour was best suited for that purpose.

The flour is taken in large quantities by the navy for use on ships and for storing in fortresses and depots. This announcement will be received with general satisfaction by Canadian millers, and it will mean a large increase in the export of our high class flour to Great Britain and the British possessions.

CANADIAN BUTTER.

Ottawa, May 30.—As a result of objections made in Cuba to Canadian butter an important investigation has been made. Some of the butter objected to was sent to Prof. Shutt for analysis. His table of constituents was as follows: Fat, 83.15 per cent.; water, 10.70; salt, 4.02; cured by difference, 2.13. This is a complete analysis, which shows that the butter was pure and entirely free from any foreign ingredient, whereas the data supplied by the Havana chemist gave no detail further than: butter, 65 per cent.; oleomargarine, 35 per cent. Such a statement does not permit of any criticism, and there is no proof contained in such a general treatment of so delicate an investigation.
