

Halifax Exhibition Notes.

The educational features of the Nova Scotia Exhibition which opens in Halifax on September 7th will be particularly strong. An evidence of this is furnished in what is proposed for the Horticultural display. The Prize List has been so arranged as to bring about contacts in apples and other fruits packed for export in line with the methods approved by the Horticultural Department at Ottawa, after thorough study of the requirements of the market. Nova Scotia fruit growers may be brought more in touch with the demand and there be a more uniformity in manner of shipment—a thing altogether desired. Judges and lecturers will be sent from the Capital to the exhibition to ensure the success of this department of the big show. An educational campaign no less valuable than that in fruit will be carried on in the Agricultural and Live Stock Departments. Provision has been made for a farmers' pavilion, that will be fitted up with a platform and will be comfortably seated. From the rostrum lectures will be delivered by such men as Dr. Jas. Fletcher, of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Mr. P. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, Mr. A. P. Ketchen, Ottawa, and Mr. Wm. Smith of Columbus, Ont., all well known as experts in agricultural and live stock matters. These men will deliver addresses on live topics of interest to the farmers and will act as judges of live stock.

An apple kept in a cellophane box will keep a rich cake moist and fresh for a long time. Remove the apple when it is withered. If a mustard poultice or plaster be mixed with vinegar instead of water all risk of a chill is avoided. If the white of an egg is used in mixing the mustard, it will not blister the most delicate skin.

In cleansing water bottles and glass jugs use tea leaves. They cleanse instantly and perfectly, leaving the glass brilliant. Hot liquids may be poured with safety into glass vessels by holding them in the hand instead of standing them upon the table.

Kerosene oil will soften boots and shoes that have long been hardened. It has been constructed on the west side by water and will render them as pliable as new.

A pint of weak hazel and three grains of borax is a simple and good remedy for a pimply skin.

Pretty throats are never yellow; they are white, firm and smooth. Let nature come to the rescue. Discard tight ribbons; they make wrinkles. For thin eyebrows add three grains of muriate of quinine to one teaspoonful of vaseline and one of talc; mix thoroughly and apply with a camel's hair brush.

The thickening of the skin brought about by handling golf sticks and tennis rackets can easily be rubbed down and away with pumice stone. Afterward rub into the palms borated vaseline and put on gloves to keep it from rubbing off.

Mothers are often worried as to what the cries of their infants mean when they seem to be sick or in pain and frequently are apt to diagnose the case wrongly. As a matter of fact, when an infant is dangerously ill it seldom cries, so that when it begins to cry a great deal during a severe illness it is usually a sign of improvement.

When a child suffers from inflammation of the lungs it moans, but rarely cries. When suffering from bronchitis the cry is gruff and rattling. When suffering from croup the cry is sharp and fretful. When hungry it is fretful and wailing.
