Now Commander of S. S. Heredia.

CAPT. H. A. HENSHAW, A FORMER REAR RIVER MAN, RECEIVES AN OFFER OF PROMOTION. Capt. H. A. Henshaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Henshaw, of Bear River, has received another promotion. For many years Capt. Henshaw has been in the employ of the United Fruit Co., his latest command being the S. S. Admiral Sampson. This ship was sold about three weeks ago to the Alaska-Pacific S. S. Co., of San Francisco and is now on her way to that port with a cargo of coal. She will run between Seattle and San Francisco and will have her passenger accommodations considerably increased. Capt. Henshaw has been promoted to the command of the United Fruit Co.'s newest ship, S. S. Heredia, which arrived in Boston in October. She is 5,000 tons and is said to be the finest fruit ship in the world. She accommodates 100 passengers and is elegantly furnished from stem to stern and contains all modern improvements. She is in fact a regular up-to-date ocean liner. The company is now building seven more large steamships in the yards of Workman & Clark, at Belfast, Ireland, which are expected to arrive on this side of the Atlantic next June. As the Heredia is on the company's Southern route, Capt. Henshaw will be sailing out of New Orleans for some time. He is one of Nova Scotia's most prominent master-mariners and we wish him continued success. He is granted a two weeks' vacation every year and we trust he will arrange to spend the next one in Digby where he already has many friends. Mrs. Henshaw and family are at present in Wolfville where the sons are attending Acadia.
