The World's Postal Service.

According to figures just published in the Archives Postales there are at present 77,000 post offices in the world spread over 97 states which cover an area of 30,000,000 sq. miles. The United States possesses the greatest number of post offices, 63,663; Germany comes second with 49,838 offices and the United Kingdom third with 23,738 offices. Russia has 18,000, France 15,000 and Italy and Austria each 9,500 offices.

The average daily postal business of the world amounts to 110,000,000 mail pieces of all sorts, representing on the estimated value of the contents of registered letters a sum of \$68,600,000. The number of the world's postal officials is 1,394,247, to which G. F. many furnishes the strongest contingent, 314,251. There are 767,868 mail boxes in the world.

Value of Coal Ashes.

Coal ashes are a valuable product of most every home. They should be sifted as soon as taken from the stove, or before they get wet, as when once wet they are very hard to sift and are not nearly so good. They are better for a dust bath for poultry than red dust, as they are not nearly so heavy. Then, too, the poultry eat quite a lot of them; which they use in egg shell formation. If coal ashes are used freely on the dropping boards, there will be no foul odor present in the coop, and by their use the ammonia in the manure is entirely retained. The droppings should then be kept dry until used. The coarse ashes make ideal walks. Dig the foundation about 10 inches deep, fill in the bottom with small stones or gravel and the coarse ashes on top.

Rural Education.

At the N. S. Farmers' Association, held in New Glasgow, Jan. 10-12, the farmers were unanimous in asking for more teaching of nature study and science related to agriculture in the rural schools that ever here-to-fore. In this they are in line with the people of Germany, Denmark, the United States and other parts of the world, who are modelling their common school systems so as to give the people a better knowledge of and interest in the various industries.

Our leading educationalists of Nova Scotia for the most part, recognize the importance of this principle, but in working it out, find that they are hampered by the lack of knowledge of natural and applied science on the part of teachers of our rural schools. It is to meet this exigency that the Summer School of Science, which convenes this year at Liverpool, N. S., and the Rural Science School, convenes annually at Truro, are conducted. Both are laudable institutions and merit the attention of all our teachers. The Summer Science School has already been discussed in these columns, and we now take opportunity to say something in regard to the Rural Science School.

This Rural Science School is conducted by the affiliated Agricultural and Normal colleges. It meets annually at Truro, where the pupils have the advantage of the excellent Provincial Laboratories, as well as of observing first hand the work in progress at the Agricultural College. This school will be in session during July and August next. A regular curriculum of studies has been prepared, which, when completed, entitles the pupil to receive a Rural Science Diploma, which entitles the holder to an increased Government Grant. In order to equalize conditions, the Government will pay travelling expenses of all teachers in attendance.

Teachers will also have an opportunity to qualify for the Physical Drill certificate. Full particulars can be had on application to the Principal of the Agricultural College, Truro.

A Week of Prayer.

Last week was observed by the members of the W. C. T. U. as a 'week of prayer.' Meetings were held every afternoon except on Saturday in the vestry of the Baptist church, and were well attended and very interesting and helpful.

The meeting on Monday was conducted by Mrs. Hemmeon, the subject being 'Peace and Arbitration.' After the singing of an appropriate hymn, prayer, and scripture reading by Mrs. DeWitt, a very excellent address on the subject was given by Mrs. (Rev.) Robinson and Mrs. Eaton. (Mrs. Rev.) Crandall followed with an original paper which was instructive and full of interest. A pleasing feature of the meeting was a vocal solo by Mrs. (Dr.) Moore, which was much appreciated.

The Tuesday afternoon meeting took the form of a mother's meeting, and was presided over by Mrs. (Rev.) Prestwood. About thirty-four ladies were present. After scripture reading by Mrs. Mitchell, singing and prayer, Mrs. Prestwood gave a short but interesting talk on the subject, 'Patience.' Short readings bearing on the subject were given by Mrs. B. G. Bishop, Mrs. B. O. Davison, Mrs. (Prof.) Colt, and Mrs. Chambers. Rev. I. C. Archibald, who was present, gave a helpful and encouraging address.

Wednesday was Children's Day. The meeting was under the leadership of Mrs. B. O. Davison, superintendent of juvenile work. About a hundred children were present and about twenty-five ladies. After the singing of a hymn, scripture reading by Mrs. Davison, and prayer by Mrs. Hemmeon, the president, Mrs. Mitchell, gave a very interesting talk to the little folk. Paraphrasing the familiar stories of childhood days he impressed upon the youthful mind in a very clever manner the evils of cider and cigarettes. A short program followed which included: a vocal solo by Mrs. Crandall, a reading by Miss Daisy Sleep, a reading by Master Waldo Davison, a solo by Mrs. (Dr.) Moore, a reading by Mrs. (Rev.) Porter, a reading by Miss M. Chute. After the singing of another hymn, in which the children heartily joined, twelve of the boys and girls took the pledge, the greater number of those present having already taken it. At the close of the exercises refreshments were served and a very encouraging meeting was brought to a close. One of the little ones asked when the next meeting of the kind was to be.

The meeting on Thursday afternoon was a memorial service for the great leader of the W. C. T. U., Miss Frances E. Willard. Mrs. DeWitt, Evangelistic Superintendent, presided, and in a few appropriate remarks explained the object of the meeting. Mrs. DeBlois gave the scripture reading and afterwards read a paper giving mature and instructive thoughts on the several passages. Mrs. Joseph Kempton gave a most interesting paper on the life and work of Miss Willard, in which she gave a description of a visit made to her old home. Much was said about her early life and her call to the great work for which she sacrificed her life. Her ability as a leader and platform speaker was certainly wonderful, and the white ribbon cause is today largely what she helped to make it through her tireless efforts. Mrs. Crandall sang a delightful solo, accompanied by Mrs. Chambers on the piano. Appropriate hymns were sung, several being special favorites of Miss Willard's, and short prayers were offered by a number of the ladies.

The concluding meeting of the series was held on Friday afternoon. Mrs. Reed presided, the subject being 'The World's Mission.' After reading of the scripture and singing, short and earnest prayers were offered by Mrs. Hemmeon, Mrs. Prestwood and Mrs. Mitchell. A most helpful and instructive address on the work of the W. C. T. U. in India was given by Mrs. (Rev.) J. C. Archibald, who with her husband is about leaving to return to that country after a furlough spent here. Her address was much appreciated by the ladies present and it was regretted that there was not a larger number present to hear it.

Another Sad Tale of the Sea.

In a wild storm that swept the Mediterranean on the night of Feb. 10, the French steamer General Chaney was lost on the reefs around the island of Minorca, an 150 persons perished, mostly French officers. Only one man, an Algerian, was saved, and he is leaving mad on account of the tortures he went through. The steamer was far out of her course and was running at full speed at the time of the catastrophe. The despatches say:

"The passengers of the Chaney were mostly French officers and officials, returning to their posts in Algeria, accompanied by their wives and children; a few soldiers, some Italians, and Tarks and one priest. The only Anglo-Saxon names on the passenger list were Green and Stakeley. They were members of an opera troupe of 11 which had been engaged to sing at Casino Algerian."

The steamer was on a voyage from Marseilles to Algiers, and was in charge of one of the most careful master mariners in the French mercantile marine employ.


