In the Common Pleas division of the High Court of Justice, Judge Street gave judgement yesterday in another Ayr school suit as follows:—Griffin v. Ayr Public School Board.—Judgment in action tried at Berlin and Toronto. Action brought by Griffin & Son, builders, of Gatt, to recover from the defendants the contract price of the stone work and foundations of a proposed Public school in the village of Ayr. The defendants denied any contract binding upon them, and further said that they never accepted the work, have made no use of it, are proceeding to errect the intended school building elsewhere, and that the work was so badly done as to be uncless to them in any event. In a former case of Davidson v.
