PUNISH THE GUILTY.

Manitoba's new Premier has declared the first duty of his government will be "to ascertain who are guilty and do to such according to law." In New Brunswick some, at least, of the guilty stand self-convicted. All that is asked of the government is "to punish such according to law." Men who resort to such despicable thieving methods as padding pay rolls by putting children on the lists and forging receipts are deserving of no consideration. In the courts of the province their cases should be judged without fear or favor, and punishment meted out in accordance with the evidence. No political or party influence should be permitted to shield those proven guilty of wrongdoing, and no political or party influence should be used to prevent a full and complete exposure. Premier Clarke and Attorney General Baxter, as the responsible officers of the government, have a difficult and unpleasant duty to perform, and there is only one way in which it can be satisfactorily performed. The disgrace brought on New Brunswick by the exposures of the past year makes imperative the application of the only remedy that can be relied on to prove salutary. Corruption in public life will never end unless a wholesome public opinion sustains those in authority in taking both punitive and preventive measures.—St. John Globe.

Provincial Scandals

The Globe last Thursday dwelt upon the gravity of the situation in provincial affairs, revealed by the Chandler enquiry, and called upon Premier Clarke to clear his skirts and put an end to the rule of graft. The Globe could not do less, and retain its self-respect, although it has been very friendly toward both the Fleming and Clarke governments. The revelations made are of such a nature as to compel the Globe and everybody either to condemn or to openly approve of the policy of graft in the conduct of provincial affairs.

Of course the St. John Standard approves. Hence it viciously attacks Mr. Veniot and Mr. Carter, distorts the evidence brought out at the enquiry in Fredericton, and endeavors to make it appear that Mr. Veniot and Mr. Carter, in revealing the political crookedness of government supporters, are themselves committing an offence and are nothing short of public enemies. While the people of New Brunswick are shamed and humiliated by the revelations, the Standard brazenly sneers, and boasts that the Clarke government is so little disturbed that it does not even take the trouble to be represented by counsel at the enquiry where it is be-

ing shown that the provincial treasury was looted.

Now, however, the enquiry is to be brought a little nearer home. Mr. Carter has asked permission to lay before Mr. Chandler definite charges to the effect that last spring the brewers, and liquor dealers and hotel men were held up for large sums of money by a prominent Conservative, at the time the question of prohibition or amendments to the liquor license law was under consideration. This matter cannot be ignored. Mr. Carter must be given an opportunity to present his charges and his witnesses. In view of the absolute proof furnished of the truth of other charges made by Mr. Carter and Mr. Veniot, the people of the province will insist that this latest charge be also investigated. The people should know the worst, and if there has been wrong-doing in connection with the liquor legislation of last spring, and the liquor dealers have been held up as the lumbermen were when Mr. Fleming was premier, the fact should be disclosed. The time was very favorable for such a raid on the pockets of the liquor men, for there were whispers abroad that prohibition might be adopted. Mr. Carter says money was collected from these men, and that they "were called upon to pay it." Who collected the money and for what purpose—and what was done with it? These questions must be answered.—St. John Times.

The Ford Profit Sharing.

There has been a great interest manifested by Ford-auto owners and others as to whether this year's issue of profit-sharing certificates would be redeemed by the company or not.

R. L. Phillips of Fredericton, Ford dealer for this territory, was in town this week and we asked him if any information had been given out from the company as yet. He replied that the Canadian company had made absolutely no announcement at that time for the coming year.

Mr. Phillips said that he expected a very interesting announcement and that he would see that the next issue of this paper had the new advertisement. Watch for it!

Probably this section never saw such good hay weather as has been continuous since July 15. The steady, fair, warm weather came just when it was needed. Hay along the upper St. John is hardly an average crop, but it is better in the northern sections of the two counties than in the southern. While some fields do not repay cutting others are beautiful—showing the good result of careful seeding and weeding. Potatoes never looked so well. They are making an excellent stand. Grain crops, until this spell of fine weather, gave a discouraging outlook. Now, however, oats and wheat look much better. There never was a real crop failure in New Brunswick, and for this let us quote the words of the hymnist: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."

Perhaps the superintendent of railway mail-service can explain why letters which should be delivered at the Hartland office do not reach here until the 5:15 train arrives. This occurrence is very common, and means that a business man cannot get his mail and answer it the same day, when he should, by the arrangement of trains, have four hours.

ISAAC MOREHOUSE BURNED OUT

The residence of Isaac Morehouse was entirely destroyed by fire at break-of-day yesterday. When discovered the fire had gained considerable headway in the woodshed and in the back part of the house. The location is about a mile from the centre of the village and entirely out of the limits, or the reach, of the fire corporation. Nevertheless the village people turned out and nearby neighbors succeeded in saving practically all the contents of the house. While The Observer has not had the opportunity of interviewing Mr. Morehouse, it passes along the unverified statement that he lost \$130 in cash. While his neighbors sympathize with Mr. Morehouse in his hardship, yet he "mourns not as one without hope," for both building and contents were well covered by insurance. In spite of whatever insurance a man may have on his property, however, being burned out of his home is always a serious matter. Only last year Mr. Morehouse met an accident that laid him up for several months.

The house that was burned was built 22 years ago by the late Benjamin Jewett, who spent his last days there. It was later occupied by the late Judson Currie for a number of years; still later the property was expropriated by the C. P. R. and resold to A. R. Foster, who transferred it to Mr. Morehouse.
