It was a late proposition. Would there not be a time when he would get into difficulties? And I can very much credit that if we go on and increase our debt each year that sometime we will find ourselves in the same position. There is only one business that I know of that could keep this up and that is the drug business with a vendor's license. I would like to say just a word in regard to prohibition. The prohibition law is no doubt the hardest law that we have to enforce, and some go so far as to say that it cannot be enforced, and the Government tells us that the Act was in force when they came into power, and that according to certain weak points in the Act they are unable to carry out the law. Now it is pretty well known that the prohibition Act is being used for revenue purposes and not for the suppression of the liquor traffic. Now my advice to the Government would be that if they wished to enforce the law to amend the Act so that they would have the power they wanted in order to make it a success, and if they do not wish to do this to come out and say that they are going to run it for the sake of the revenue.

Now Mr. Speaker, I will try and get back to the subject again, and I doubt the Government will say that they cannot cut down their expenditure any as the demands of the public will not allow it and that the public service must be maintained. My own opinion is, Mr. Speaker, that the expenditure of this Province can be greatly reduced without any injury to the Public Service. The heads of the different departments of the Government will have to cut down his overhead expenses just the same as every body else has done in the past few years, and what is true of one is true of the other and I would suggest that they start at the head and how to the tail in every department. I believe that has been done in at least one department and should be followed by the others.

We have heard a great deal about losses from forest fires, and from butchery, and also from spring freshets. We all realize that the destruction of property was great and that it took an immense amount of money to repair the damage to our roads and bridges. I know that in Carleton County the damage during the freshet was great and that it required a large expenditure to repair and rebuild, and I think perhaps it is quite hard for some in sections where the freshet was not so heavy to realize how hard it was. But what I am sure that the greatest loss we have sustained is the loss of many of our Canadian born men and women to many of our boys and girls who have gone to other countries to try and better their condition. This graft has been mostly from our rural districts and does not speak well for the agricultural industry of this country upon which we are depending for our growth and prosperity.

If the manufacturer is not making his business pay they simply get together and raise the price of the article being manufactured to a price that will pay. If a telephone company finds that their rates charged will not return a dividend, and rightly so, as capital should be paid the same as in other cases, they will raise the rates and have a rate fixed that will pay all expenses, allow for depreciation, and pay a reasonable interest on the capital invested.

Now, I do not say that it is possible to do this in the case of the farmer but were it possible to do so I feel sure that all the vacant farms would be picked up again and that we would have a happy and a contented people in the rural districts at least.

Now, what we need to make conditions better in this province, to my mind, we need more industries, better markets, lower freight rates, better schools, and better roads in rural, and especially outlying districts.

There has been a great deal of advice given to the farmer as to what he should raise, and in most cases he is advised to go into the dairy business or at least into mixed farming. Now I myself am in favor of mixed farming but the returns from the dairy, from beef, pork, hay and oats are not such that would be very encouraging unless living the advantage of a local market.

It is rather amusing to note how many of those giving advice claim that they are not farmers but were born on a farm, and I suppose for this reason should know what is best. It is a wonder that more of these gentlemen did not stay on the farm and put farming on a paying basis. I wonder if they ever took a pencil and figured out what it would cost to raise cattle to a stage when they would be fit for beef or the dairy. If you just allow one cent per day for the labor of a cow, and until the animal is three years old you will find that you have about thirty-three dollars which is

more than we could get for a three-year-old in Carleton county during the last year, and say nothing about the feed to raise the animal.

The honorable member from Kings county told us the other day about twelve cows that returned a profit of one hundred dollars each for the year. I think he must have meant gross returns and not net profit. He also pictured a very dismal scene in Carleton and Victoria counties where they are raising a few potatoes and where the people did not have any Christmas dinner this year. I would like sir to correct that statement, and while the people of Carleton and Victoria counties did lose a lot of money immediately after the war and have had a hard fight but with true Canadian courage they are coming back again, and while we have lost some of our best citizens, we have learned the lesson that others have learned, and are learning, and that this Government and other Governments must learn, and that is to earn more and save more, and to spend less.

Now just a word about hydro development. I am glad to hear the development is now on a paying basis and is taking care of itself, and that they feel justified in going on with the Grand Falls development. Speaking for myself I think the great majority of the people of Carleton county, I may say that I am strongly in favor of development, if it can be shown to be a profitable undertaking. I am in favor of the work being done through a hydro commission representing the whole people. One of the boards to be a representative of the rural districts in order that justice may be done to masses of the people, but that the benefits of the development may be had by the rural districts (wherever feasible) as well as the urban population. I firmly believe that a market will be found for the power faster than it can be developed. I understand that Ontario is spending ten millions every year on hydro and cannot supply it fast enough. We cannot realize the benefit this will be to the province. It will bring many new industries and encourage old ones, all of which will bring back many of our own people to the province again. Owing to the scarcity of fuel I believe the time is not far distant when electric current will be used for heating purposes in some localities, and it will also be used for running our railway trains, our motor cars and such like.

Just here I want to say just a word about motor cars or rather about the auto tax. At the present time we are taxed \$1 per hundred weight on our cars and in addition twenty per cent of this amount for patrol purposes on trunk roads. While I am strongly in favor of the patrol system, I believe the tax to be unfair to many of the people who pay it. As I see it the people who pay it, to provide a fund to build the roads, and the patrol tax is for the upkeep of the roads. Now I believe that the people who use the road should pay the most toward the upkeep. We have a great many people throughout the province who own cars, but who do not get out upon the trunk roads very little, and should not pay as much when they only drive say one thousand miles as the other fellow that drives ten thousand miles. If this tax must be imposed it should be done by a gasoline tax. No doubt it will be said that the fisherman's motor boat and stationary engines and tractors, but it is done in other provinces and (Continued on page 3)

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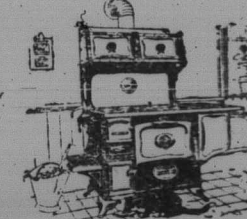
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NOTICE OF SALE
