

pers was that the extent of the reduction they could reasonably expect of the railways in their rates to Brit h Columbia would be of doubtfu stance and that there was mor to be gained by so informing the re ways and requesting them to go the mit in reductions to the Prair Provinces instead, where is is consid red four or five hundred cars ca ossibly be placed. Their represent tions along these lines were very fav ourably considered by the railways, who expressed appreciation of the shippers' withdrawal of pressure regarding rates to the Pacific Coast. In previous correspondence we had informed the railways that to be really useful, their reduction would have to be from \$1.31 as at present to \$1.07 or the Edmonton rate blanketed to the coast. The railway stated positively that they could not go as far as that without actual out-of-pocket loss on the traffic.
