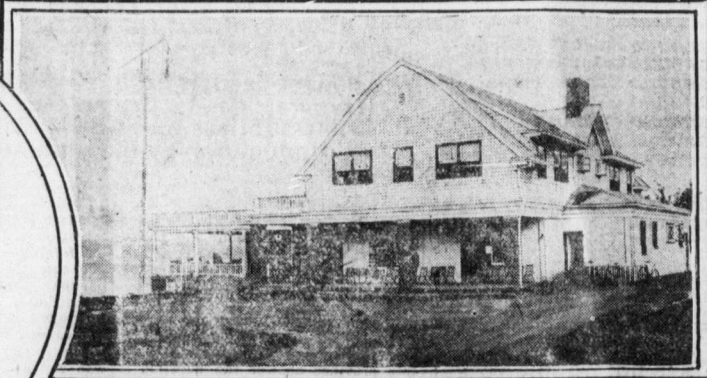


Friendship of Wives is Most Amazing Feature of Hains Tragedy Due to Captain's Love for His Family

TOMMY COWARD WON THIS TIME

Another Grand Contest Between Him and Harry Ryan in the Firemen's Marathon Race Last Evening.

The three mile Marathon race for boys of 17 years and under which was conducted last evening in connection with the firemen's festival was won by Tommy Coward after one of the hardest races seen hereabouts for many a day. Harry Ryan finished second this time, thus reversing the order of things, while Jimmie Lowrie was a good third, running a remarkable race for a boy only 14 years of age.

The race was a hard fought contest with a game exhibition by the three runners who landed ahead and were some distance in advance of the other competitors. The distance was about 2 3/4 miles so far as can be learned and the time in which it was covered was about 16 1/2 minutes.

No Police Protection or Light. Had the firemen been given the aid that they should have received from the other civic departments the race would have been ever more of a success than it was. If a watering cart had been sent over the course an hour or two before the start the dust would have been laid and it would have been easier on the boys who were enveloped in clouds of dust almost all the time from start to finish. Hundreds of citizens turned out to see the race, the crowds at each corner being large and with everybody anxious to see their favorites win. If the street lights had been turned on—and it was then time that they were on—the people would have been able to distinguish the different runners. At the rink where the race finished there were several hundred people gathered and the spectators could hardly tell one runner from another. Then the policemen were conspicuous by their absence, which is contrary to practice in all cities, and the crowds at times left little chance for the runners to make headway near the finish.

Race Was a Big Success. But with all these disadvantages the race was a grand exhibition and showed that Frederick has among the boys who are growing up some athletes who will win more than local reputations before concluding their career.

The start from the Central Horse Station was made at sharp 7:30 o'clock. Chief Rutter acted as starter and started off at a lively pace. They soon began to strike out and when they got up to Smythe street one lot with Percy Gough, Nelson Smith, Walter Smith and some others were off in the lead with the second division including Harry Ryan, Tommy Coward, Jimmie Lowrie and others about 50 yards or perhaps 100 yards behind. On the trip down Charlotte street and along University Avenue the fast ones made up the advantage and the three finishing first took the lead. At about the corner of Queen and St. John streets young Ryan started to sprint and up Queen street the runners tore at a lively pace. After passing the Barker House Tommy Coward took the lead, being in apparently better shape, but Ryan came back strong at the post office and appeared to be gaining when he interfered with a boy on a bicycle and the crowd on the corner. He finished well up, however, and was a good second. With Tommy Coward leading the crowd broke into cheers and as each of the runners finished he was given a good reception. Eric McDonald Won the 1/4 Mile. The quarter mile race during the progress of the festival was won by Eric McDonald, Tommy Coward being second and Nelson Smith, 3rd.

The next race will be on Labor Day at the Frederick Brass Band picnic and entries close tomorrow with Geo. G. Parker, president of the band.

KERR IN 9 4-5 SECONDS. Hamilton Sprinter Shows Himself Fastest Man in Canada—Schaefer Did Not Show Up.

Hallifax, Sept. 2.—Equaling the Canadian record under very unfavorable conditions "Bobbie" Kerr demonstrated his right to be called the fastest sprinter in Canada by doing the hundred yards dash in 9 4-5 seconds at the exhibition track tonight. Much to the disappointment of his friends Schaefer, who secured the hundred yards championship on Saturday last, did not compete tonight, claiming that he had difficulty in getting away from his work in the post office where he is employed as a clerk. It was also a keen disappointment for Kerr, who remained over expressly for the purpose of meeting Schaefer. The Hamilton man's magnificent exhibition left little doubt in the minds of the spectators that he is the fastest sprinter. Wm. Ross of the Wanderers won the mile run in 4:33 3-5 with Pryor, his club mate, second. Tom Longboat was third. In the five mile run, however, Longboat was the victor, winning the event handsily from Goodfield in 26:47.

Hallifax, N. S., Sept. 2.—Fine warm weather, a fast track and straight heats racing marked the opening day of what, judging from the amount and quality of the racing in the Maritime Circuit this year will probably prove one of the most successful of exhibition race meetings. THREE DAYS SPORT FOR PUGILISTS

Three Championship Events to Be Called on in California Within Three Days.

San Francisco, Sept. 2.—Three pugilistic contests, each involving the championship of its respective class, will be decided in California next week. One of them is an international match between Owen Moran, the English champion, and Abe Attell, the holder of the featherweight title in America. The other two are between Stanley Ketchell and Billy Papke, for the middleweight championship, and Battling Nelson and Joe Gans for the lightweight title. In every case the fights are what might be termed as return matches, as all have met their respective opponents in previous battles. Ketchell and Papke and Moran and Attell will fight on September 7th, the former two at Los Angeles, the latter at San Francisco, both bouts taking place in the afternoon. Two days later Joe Gans and Battling Nelson will meet for the third time. This fight will take place in the afternoon also. Not since the famous boxing carnival at New Orleans in 1890, when Jim Corbett won the championship from John L. Sullivan, have so many important ring engagements been scheduled to come off within three days.

TRUSTED CHIEF PILFERED STAMPS

Shortage of \$53,000 in Accounts of Cuban Post Office Official—Under Arrest.

Havana, Sept. 2.—Ricardo Rodriguez, chief of the bureau of supplies and vouchers in the Havana post office, who disappeared after the discovery of a shortage in that department, amounting to \$53,135, was arrested by the police last night. He was in hiding and disguised when the police found him. Rodriguez is 70 years old and was employed for ten years for the Philadelphia post office, entering the Cuban service from that city at the time of the first American intervention. According to the police the shortage in the bureau of supplies has been going on for several years. Sheets of stamps were abstracted from the original packages, which were then re-sealed, so that the taking of stock did not reveal the deficiency. Suspicion was at last aroused, and Postmaster General Hernandez, who was not long in learning that the dishonest practices centered in the bureau in which Rodriguez was chief, ordered a count of all the stamps, whereby the exact amount of the deficiency was ascertained.
