The Educational Institute Held a Public Meeting

Addresses by Dr. Laird, Dean of the School for Teachers at MacDonald College, Quebec, and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health

Last evening's session of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick took the form of a public meeting, which was held at the Normal School building and was largely attended, being featured by addresses by Dr. Laird, Dean of the School for Teachers at MacDonald College, Quebec, and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health. Deputy Mayor T. S. Wilkinson extended to the Association the heartiest of welcomes on behalf of the City of Fredericton, stating that he hoped the stay of the members in the city would be a pleasant one, to which Dr. W. S. Carter, on behalf of the Association, replied briefly.

Prof. Sinclair Laird, Dean of the MacDonald College School for Teachers, was then introduced. He stated that it was necessary in the interests of democracy that all the public be well educated.

The speaker gave Huxley's definition of a liberal education: "That man has received a liberal education who is so trained in his youth that his body is a servant to his will." "One must learn to love all beauty whether of Nature or of God," Milton said that he called a complete education that which fitted a man for public as well as private duties.

The individual differences of pupils were not two ways of teaching two pupils alike. Many a good farmer was spoiled by being kept at school too long, and the same was true of many clergymen, who would have made better farmers. One youth could have many personalities and many individual differences and all youths could not be treated alike and properly educated at the same time. Human handling of children and less instruction would help them more than more instruction and less handling. To standardize curriculum would not be a very beneficial diet for the child and more education as distinct from instruction was required. Many parents complained because manners, courtesy and politeness were not taught at school. These should be done at home. The tendency was increasing more and more to have parents do more of their duties and lay them at the door of the teacher.

Many children, he stated, had not chance to develop their interests or their inclinations because of the confinement of their homes. These played a large part in the education of the youth according to the environment; bright homes would produce bright scholars, and vice versa. Social education and a little less attention to some line of work in which a youth was deeply interested was the best for education.

The good home served to promote cleanliness, and cleanliness helped in education. Teachers should not judge hastily but should give thought to home conditions before any punishment was inflicted for any offense in connection with uncleanliness.

Pupils often followed the examples set them by their parents and in some cases turned out slothful students. The mother's example and advice was always followed and her influence on the pupil was above that of the father.

"If the spirit of taking advantage of all the school education possible were taken up better citizenship would result," the speaker stated. Parents were often asking that pupils be changed from one room of a school to another so they could get along better with fellow students. Some parents thought too much of their own children and refused to compare them with others.

When parental influence was on the side of the school very little trouble was ever brought about with the children. Many people were often jealous of the influence of the teacher on the pupil but in most cases this was easily gotten over.

Personality of the teacher and personal and individual relationship was one of the greatest factors in teaching. The speaker referred to his own college days, giving an illustration of the personal relationship between the teacher and the student.

The personal relationship of the teacher and pupil often promoted a feeling of deep affection between the two and that teacher who could refer back over the years to his pupils was always a success. Kindness for others weaker than themselves often helped in making a successful teacher.

Prof. Laird was full of inspiration to the teacher, and time after time quoted illustrations of wit and pathos suitable to his different examples.

The Devon quartette was called upon for a selection, which was excellently rendered and enjoyed.

Minister of Health.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Public Health of the province of New Brunswick succeeded Prof. Laird as a speaker. The importance of the health question in connection with the teaching profession could not be exaggerated too much, he stated. Everyone knew that out of the ranks of the teachers themselves during the past 40 years the best class of citizenship had arisen. The relation of public health and the public school was close and important. The teachers constituted the sole hope of the other four-fifths of the nation, and it was the duty of the public health department to protect them for future service.

The partnership tended to become greater every day. The fancy that the sound body impeded the sound mind, as held by learned men during past centuries, was now ridiculed, and it was found to be just the opposite. It invited us to see that the teachers survived, and survived so that they would be capable of further work.

In education there are two partners, the school and the public health authority, whose influence never waned. In passing, the parent, he stated, did not come within the scope as much as the child. The father and mother had in the child the only hope of a future happiness, and with the proper medical inspection were assured of this.

The speaker dealt with the duties as laid out in the medical inspection of schools and stated that close confinement in schools tended to injure the well being of the child and should

be well looked into. No other state or political unit in Canada has inaugurated a movement—such as the one begun by the Health Department of New Brunswick during the past twelve months. In dispensing such a service as medical inspection of schools, large areas were necessary to be covered, but the speaker stated the medical inspection had been used in every school district in New Brunswick. Much better results would be obtained at a later date than the results of today. Good health was the best thing one could give a child, for it supplied the way to happiness and content.

The relationship between school and public health took a large part in other activities of living besides the teaching profession. After teachers were imbued with proper medical care for the students, the proper living was found. The lack of good nourishment and suitable clothing had played a large part in the death rate of the province, but this was now decreasing.

"We have resolved to face forward and repudiate many evils with which our forefathers were afflicted," the speaker stated, "and we ask for the co-operation of the Teachers' Association in doing so."
