 HIS DOGS NOT WIDE ENOUGH.  
 TREASURY AGENT SMITH HAS TO KEEP HIS MOOSE HEAD IN HIS OFFICE.  
 Boston, April 25.—Col. Converse J. Smith, special agent of the United States Treasury department, received this week a magnificent mounted moose head, which he has displayed in his office in Federal building.  
 It is believed the moose must have weighed more than 1,000 pounds. He was captured in the province of Quebec, in the vicinity of Riviere-Louis, the famous moose district, and a great fishing resort, and was presented to Colonel Smith by Mr. J. H. Galt, general manager of the Temiscouata railway.  
 The head is one of the finest ever seen in New England, and is attracting much attention. The distance between the antlers, which are 32 inches long, is 3 feet 7 inches. The distance from the tip of the antler to the forehead measures 2 feet, and the ears are 10 inches long.  
 Col. Smith tried to get the fine specimen into his house, but only the outer double doors were broad enough to admit it.

**DEATH OF MR. GEORGE W. DAY.**  
 ST. JOHN LOSES AN OLD AND HIGHLY RESPECTED CITIZEN.  
 Mr. George W. Day died yesterday morning, after a long illness, at his residence 61 Pitt street, after an illness of only one week of bronchitis. By his death the city loses an active citizen, and one who for over half a century has been most actively engaged in all that pertained to the welfare of St. John. A printer by trade he was a printer through all his life and has seen many changes for the better in the art preservative of arts. Mr. Day was born in this city in 1824, and was therefore in his 74th year. While yet a child, he went to New York with his parents, and later to the "Tobacco" where he remained until the death of his father and mother; then, at the age of 12 years, he removed to Woodstock, where he located as apprentice to Mr. William Gilbert, who published the first paper in that town. The boy's next change was to return to his native city, where he continued in the printing business under Mr. G. E. Fenby for a time, and also with the late Mr. J. McMillan. In 1847 just 20 years ago, he started on business for himself. Since then, up till two years ago, he has been steadily engaged in that business. He has published more papers, probably than any other man in St. John, of whom some he was publisher, and some he also owned at periods in his useful life. He was the first printer of the Daily Telegraph, and continued in that position till the Telegraph set up its own office. This paper was printed by the fire of 1877, and once more, for some months, till it was again established in quarters of its own. Mr. Day was a printer. He for a time owned and published the True Patriotist, and has also published the Messenger and Visitor. Lately he has

**THE FRESHET!**  
**METAPEDIA A FLOATING VILLAGE.**  
 On Monday evening word was received here that the ice had spread in the Upsalquitch river, and backed up by a heavy freshet, carried away the Upsalquitch bridge, near Robinsonville, Tuesday, owing to the jam of ice, the water rose rapidly and at noon the English Church at Dawson's rafting ground was filled with water, and Dawson's barn was also filled.  
 Several families who resided on the east bank of the Upsalquitch, above Robinsonville were compelled to move from their houses and seek higher ground. Late in the day word was received that Moore's mill and cook house at Moore's settlement was completely tarred round.  
 The water kept steadily rising in the river, and things began to look serious for the residents of Metapedia.  
 About five o'clock Tuesday evening, another larger in the direction of the Metapedia river threatened to add to the already serious condition of affairs and as expected, at 6 o'clock p.m. the bridge over the Metapedia—better known as the Blackquitch bridge—was swept away. This was carried for some distance by the ice, and jammed about a mile above Metapedia. The ice which came piling down on top of this had to find way some way and piled up till it covered the railway track. The blockade of ice thus formed, delayed the trains of Tuesday night for many hours. And not till the working train under the supervision of Supt. Renfell's himself had been sent up and the debris cleared away could the trains proceed, the evening train not getting into Campbellton till an early hour yesterday morning.

**BATHURST NOTES.**  
 Bathurst, April 26.—A new cheese factory is to be erected at New Bathurst this spring. A company has been formed and shares are now being disposed of. The prospects are good for an industry of this kind in that section of the county as the people are all farmers and many of them successful. If there is a general co-operation in the enterprise it will doubtless prove a success and a source of increased income to the shareholders.  
 Plans for the proposed new bridge across the Big river at Bathurst have been advanced by the city council. The present plan contemplates the building of the new bridge on the site occupied by the old one, much to the disappointment and annoyance of the traveling public on both sides of the river. A special effort has been made to secure a change of site to a much more convenient situation and Mr. Emmett, the commissioner of public works, just a visit to Bathurst last week for a consultation in the matter. It has not been learned what decision has been arrived at.  
 The ice is still in the harbor but it looks as if a few more days will see it away as the ice is moving and will soon be gone.  
 Large numbers of men have gone to the drives and at present the prospect for a general move of the cuts of two years are regarded as good.  
 Portable mills in the vicinity of Bathurst have been at work for some time and are doing good work. The three large mills located here are getting in readiness for a busy summer. If the lumber gets down this will be one of the best seasons that Bathurst has known for years.—Telegraph.

The message passed around town yesterday in regard to the ice just above Metapedia, had completely torn out the L.C. track and bridge, and as a result, a week's work of men and machinery were made to send up the auxiliary car.

As a large number of citizens were desirous of seeing the sights—which we hope will never be seen again—Superintendent Bennett ordered a first-class car to be attached and this was, completely filled, among the number being several ladies, namely, Mrs. A. E. Alexander and Mrs. Edna Alexander, Miss O'Keefe, Miss Muirhead and Miss Edie Johnson.  
 About 9.30 the train of laborers and sight-seers started for the scene of the L.C. track and bridge, and as a result, a week's work of men and machinery were made to send up the auxiliary car.

Although the water had receded some feet canoes were necessary to remove the goods from the partly submerged houses and stores. The one solid side walk were being used as floating connections between the houses and the higher land, to better effect and those removing goods to work to advantage.  
 The church, Denton's shop and post office, Ferguson's house and store, Gillis' house and store, Alex. Adams and Mrs. Ayler's houses were all partly submerged, and had to be removed about a mile above Metapedia. The ice which came piling down on top of this had to find way some way and piled up till it covered the railway track. The blockade of ice thus formed, delayed the trains of Tuesday night for many hours. And not till the working train under the supervision of Supt. Renfell's himself had been sent up and the debris cleared away could the trains proceed, the evening train not getting into Campbellton till an early hour yesterday morning.
