MULOCK'S RESIGNATION.

Postmaster General Retires From Public
Life on Account of Ill
Health.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—Sir William Mulock's retirement is semi-final, he announced this afternoon.

Sir William leaves the cabinet postmaster-general solely on account of ill health.

In 1901 he was sent to Australia as representative of Canada and on the long ocean voyage he contracted neuritis, which left a rheumatic condition behind.

Lately this trouble had been do-
ing him but of such character as to
be intensified by the strain of public
life. Physicians said he must
have a less exacting occupa-
tion and his resignation is the result.

Francis Laurier will tender Sir William a farewell dinner Monday night and all the cabinet ministers then in the city will be present.

IN THE POULTRY YARD
The following are a few sugges-
tions from an exchange—
Fowls quite often begin to show
symptoms of scaly legs, which
although not a disease in itself,
sometimes leads to disorders which
do much injury. It is an affliction
peculiar to the summer months
and is caused by a small parasite
which burrows under the skin of
the legs above the feet and gradu-
ally grows, producing a hard
rough surface. As a preventive
of scaly legs, kerosene is most
effective if liberally applied to the
feet. The legs of a fowl which
have already become afflicted
should be washed with a mixture
of sulphur lard and kerosene,
repeated every few days until
scabs disappear. The best plan,
however, is to take all precaution-
ary measures before the affliction
appears. Prevention is always
better than a cure and is cheaper.

People in general do not realize
the value of charcoal for poultry.
It is a tonic and a cure for many
ailments with which fowls are
afflicted, especially bowel trouble
caused by indigestion.

It is of little value unless fresh,
as it otherwise does not possess
the power of absorbing gases.
For this reason a little charcoal
placed in the poultry house at a
time. To secure the best results,
place the charcoal in a hot
oven until it becomes thoroughly
heated, then pound it in pieces
not larger than grains of rice.

Even if stale charcoal, well pre-
pared for poultry, it would still
be best to heat it before using, as it
absorbs all bad odors and gases,
and is not so harmful if fed in that
condition. Heat purifies it so that
all harmful qualities are destroyed.

Grain of any kind parched until
it is black is one of the best forms
in which charcoal can be fed. To
keep the fowls busy, burn some
corn in the oven until it is thor-
oughly charred and throw it to them
by that way. They are exceedingly
fond of it and get from the col-
or kept from working at it for a
fourth.

when available, until wanted for
use.
