RECIPROcity TREATY.

We gave in our last, a copy of the despatch from Lord Clarendon to Sir Edmund Head, Lt. Governor of New Brunswick, by which it appears that the noble Lord either conceives that New Brunswick having, by the Resolution of its Legislature in its last Session, given a pledge that the Treaty would be ratified by her: and that therefore, the participation in the fisheries by the Americans may as well be considered at; or, that the Treaty having been ratified by the Imperial Government, it must go immediately into operation. In either way, he seems to have considered the passing of the Law as a matter of course, also why allow the American fishermen to at once take possession of the fishing grounds before compliance with one of the conditions, viz., the assent of the Colonial Legislature, was formally announced? We have been given to understand that our own General Assembly has been called together and appointed to meet on Tuesday next, for the express purpose of giving its assent to a Law confirming of the provisions of the Treaty. And we take this early opportunity of again pressing upon the consideration of the Legislature the absolute necessity of passing an Act to enable aliens to hold lands in this Colony. A similar Act has been passed, and is, we understand, in force in Nova Scotia, and if the concession of this privilege to strangers was deemed necessary to the advancement of the trade of Nova Scotia, it is certainly no less so to that of P. E. Island. All that we want to make this Colony respectable in capital, and intelligence, to enable the possessors to use it to advantage, and these we ought to welcome by every means in our power. At present the Island does not possess sufficiently powerful attractions for persons of wealth, who have no object beyond the enjoyment of it; to make it a permanent abode. There is not that progress in the copious supply of the comforts of life and appliances of luxury, to induce those of older and more advanced communities, to settle down among us, though the purity of the air, the simplicity of the mode of living, and the absence of all inducements to spend either money or time in the pursuit of mere luxuries may render it a convenient and agreeable temporary abode for those in quest of health, or who seek to economize their means, and at the same time participate in the enjoyment of all the necessities accompanied by the usual common comforts of existence. If our agriculture, the advancement of which should be the principal object of the care of Government, is ever to attain to the height of developing the whole energies of our fertile soil; if we are to derive the utmost benefit from the inexhaustible supply of fish on our coast, we must endeavour to attract to our shores those whose previous knowledge and habits accompanied by the means of availing themselves of them, are calculated to make these bounteous provisions of Providence a means of adding to the wealth and riches of the country. And how is this to be effected unless we give them the means of settling and becoming denizens; unless we arrest the profits and gains to be made by the fisheries, and fix them to our land. This is a most important matter, and we trust will not be lost sight of.

NEW DIVISION.

A Charter having been granted for a Division of the Sons of Temperance, to be located in the West River settlement, Township No. 47, King's County, under the name of ALLIANCE, No. 20, the ceremony of institution was performed on the 14th inst., by Mr. Arbuckle, P. M. W. P. assisted by Mr. Robertson, (Palmer) P. W. P. George Town.

The agitation of the Temperance Question in that flourishing section of the country, and the harmony which uniformly characterized the meetings lately held there to arouse and ascertain the popular sentiment in relation to the prohibition of the Liquor Traffic, furnish encouraging indications of the progress and prospects of the Movement in favour of a Maine Law in P. E. Island.

The attendance on these occasions was remarkably respectable, and the courtesy and attention of the people towards the lecturer, sustained the generous and benevolent character for which the community in the East Point Districts have been always proverbial.

The Public Meeting in the West River School House immediately previous to the organization of the Alliance was pre-eminently interesting.

MR. HASZARD.

In your paper of the 13th inst., I have read, that it is intended to present a Petition to the House of Assembly, praying that Teachers' salaries should be paid quarterly, which I much approve of: but I would approve of it a great deal more if it stretched a little further, by praying that Teachers may be empowered, when engaged a Teacher, and when willing to give him a certain sum to pay for his board, to cause the inhabitants of the district, in proportion to their circumstances, and in proportion to the number of pupils they could respectively send. I heard several Teachers, men of great experience and otherwise of good intentions, regretting that there was not a clause in the Act to this effect. The people in general, now plainly perceive and appreciate the cheapness, the efficacy and the blessing the present School Act confers upon the rising generation. The chief part are therefore freely willing to make up a certain amount for a Teachers' Board, whilst others, (and in good circumstances too) actuated by patriotic, unobscured motives, are glad to take advantage of the Act; consequently, they get out free. Sometimes the settlement loses the services of a good Teacher through this delinquency and the deficiency of the Act.

It is quite obvious that the salary of Teachers is not sufficient when it is minus their board. Why! anything of respectable board will not be got less than ten shillings a week, which would reduce the salary to the paltry sum of twenty-four pounds a year: the insufficiency thereof for any man who moves in a respectable sphere of life is too glaring to comment upon. And, should he have a family, how is he to manage? I believe there is not a building set apart for Education in the Island, excepting the Academy, that has any accommodations for a Teachers' family. As I have already trespasses rather too much on your valuable time and space I will say no more on the subject at present. I merely make these remarks, hoping when the proper time arrives the Legislature will take the subject into consideration.

OUR PAPER.

We have, for the last few weeks, been obliged to issue our paper of a smaller sized page than usual, from the want of our proper sized paper. Our readers, however, will have but little reason to complain, as we have given them a double sheet when there has been much news of importance. The scarcity of paper in effecting the whole of the newspaper press of the world; many of the weekly ones have terminated their existence, and some of the strongest, are curtailing their dimensions. The *New York Tribune*, one of the first standing in the United States, came to us last week much reduced in size, and even the *London Times* has felt the effects of the limited supply to such an extent that its proprietor has offered £1000 for the finding out of a substitute for rag in the manufacture of paper. We have before us paper made of 80 per cent of straw, and the manufacturer anticipates bringing it to greater perfection, but we have our doubts, as the specimen he has sent us is so dark in colour as that in common use 20 years ago; it has, besides, a harsh crackling feeling which militates much against it as a printing paper.—It may, however, be successfully used as a writing paper.

The scarcity of an article is sure to raise its value, and we find that our stock just imported is full thirty per cent dearer than it was last year. We have made no corresponding rise in our subscription price, but we hope when we appear in our usual size next week, that our subscribers will recollect this. If they wish us to keep up our issue twice a week and of the same dimensions, they will be punctual in their payments, as money is the only thing that will enable us to lay in a good supply for the winter.
