Feb. 1—The death of Miss Dorothy Graham, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Graham, occurred on Friday at the home of her parents, after a three weeks' illness. The deceased who was fifteen years of age, had a bright, cheerful disposition, and was a general favorite.

When a small girl, playing at school, she had injured a knee, and it had occasioned her considerable trouble. About two years ago, she was in the St. John's hospital for treatment. She had again been having trouble with it and it had turned to a bad tuberculosis. Beside her parents, she leaves to support her two brothers and three sisters. The eldest, Miss Annie Graham, a trained nurse, in St. John's, N. S., the youngest is a baby.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. The services in St. Mary's Church of England and in the grave were conducted by the pastor of the church.

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


