The authorities of Castello De Rugat concealed the fact that the disease raged there for a fortnight. Fifty cases occurred at that place, seventeen of which proved fatal. The fact that the disease prevailed was concealed to avoid the isolation of the place. A suspicious case has been received at a hospital in Madrid. The Madrid Gazette says in the last two months there have been four hundred and forty-five cases of cholera in Spain. Two hundred and fifty-one have been fatal.
