to the Railway. If the Railway trains travelled on any and every road, as the automobile does, it would be just as great a nuisance.

Hon. Mr. Dalton spoke in favor of the resolution. Hon. Mr. Stewart said that he did not blame the people of this Province for the feeling that existed in opposition to motor vehicles.

Mr. Beaulieu continued the debate. He considered that the delegation that had waited on the Government in this matter was not such as he could approve of.

Mr. Feehan said the bill would doubtless pass if a majority of the people's representatives favored it. It was his opinion that it would be a pity to have any division.

Dr. Dowar said that as this is brought in as a Government measure necessary protection for it should be made. He considered that the running of autos over the Hillsborough bridge could scarcely be attended without accident.

Mr. McInnion said we are regarded as backward without automobiles; but he thought we were further ahead than many who have automobiles.

Mr. L. L. Jenkins spoke in favor of the bill. Mr. Dolbe also supported it. Mr. Dolbe said he understood the bill prohibiting automobile running was enacted in consequence of petitions asking for it.

When the House resumed at 3.15, Hon. Mr. McInnion resumed his speech. He considered that the bill contemplated was to be a test of the desires of the people regarding the running of automobiles.

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Mr. John A. Dewar said he had a good deal of respect for those who favored the repeal contemplated by this resolution. He took exception to certain expressions that had been used by some of those supporting the resolution.

During the remainder of Thursday afternoon, public and private bills were advanced from stage to stage. At the evening sitting the budget debate was resumed and completed.
