Frightful Explosion.

Buffalo, N.Y., Jan. 4.-Three mer vere killed and nine frightfully burned in an explosion and fire which de stroyed the plant of the Buffalo Cereal Company to-night. The explosion was in the yollow corn mill, and concrete and brick elevator, 140 feet high, adjoining it, was shattered by the concussion and fell through the roof of the mill. Of twelve men employed in the clevator, not one escaped injury. The explosion is believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion in the grain dust.
