The Harbor Grace Exhibition.

The Daily News announces that an invitation has been extended to His Excellency the Administrator to be present at the opening of the Exhibition at Harbor Grace next week, and that the Prime Minister and the Minister of Agriculture will leave for Harbor Grace on Tuesday morning. It is also stated that His Excellency the Governor is not likely to be able to be present, owing to the delay in the departure of the Mongolian from England. It is to be hoped that Sir Edward Morris will govern himself, according to the spirit of the invitation extended to His Excellency the Administrator.

This should absolutely preclude Sir Edward Morris from any attempt to use the opening of the exhibition at Harbor Grace for partisan propaganda. Sir Edward did what he could to make the Agricultural Exhibitions at Burin and St. George's political shows. In the presence of a representative of the King he must surely refrain. If Sir Edward continues to treat these exhibitions as platforms on which to boost political exhibits, then we shall treat them as he is treating them and expose the use he is making of them.

A Sad Case.

By the Prospero we learn that a young chap named M. Gould, of Flower's Cove, came up here by the ship and went to the Lunatic Asylum, he being mentally unbalanced. The boy who worked during the summer on the telegraph line became ill of a sore leg, was visited by Dr. Grenfell when he went to Flower's Cove in the Strathcona, and was taken to Battle Harbor Hospital for treatment. His mother accompanied him, and could ill afford to do so as her husband is ill and she has another son who is stone blind. The sick boy was therefore her only support. When the mother and son reached Battle Harbor, Dr. Grievie was about to close up the hospital and the boy and his mother, with 40 other patients who were taken on board on stretchers, came up to St. Anthony Hospital by the Prospero. The boy showed symptoms of insanity all through and the doctor at St. Anthony refused him admission to the hospital there. He and his mother were put on board for St. John's, and coming up it was found that the woman was destitute, had very little clothes on her and had not a cent in her pocket. Chief Steward Miller and Rev. Mr. Pitcher went around amongst the passengers and collected about \$16 for her. The boy on arrival was taken to the Lunatic Asylum, accompanied by his mother, and after she can purchase some clothes will go into a boarding house and will be later sent home by the Prospero. The poor woman has no person to earn for her now and is much concerned about the condition of her husband and the blind boy left behind.

At the time when preparations were between seven and eight years ago, attention of the present edition, it was all that could be done in the way of the Encyclopaedia Britannica as had already been accomplished by the issue of the present edition. You have had that peculiar result, such an intellectual creation which came into existence in the great interval of time, perhaps, of 15 years, as did the Ninth Edition. In this Edition the whole of the early part of the Encyclopaedia Britannica was out of date by the time it got to Z. There is an end of that irregularity, and surely it is a very great achievement that the first time you should have a real book, a book, say, with structural unity and not a set of disconnected monographs or of puzzling discrepancies.
