A host of men have been provided with an annual salary in connection with an Agricultural policy, and instead o creating Elective Boards as promised that outport settlements might man-age their own local affairs, money has been cut up and doled out amongst an army of special commissioners, a gross outrage of the solemn pledge o Sir Edward Morris that a simple and inexpensive means of electing Road Boards would be provided that out-port people might "have a fuller share in the management of their local af-
