London club gossip has it that in consequence of so many titled ladies becoming widows, a secret society has been formed, the members of which have pledged themselves, if they should contemplate marrying again, to accept only men who have been wounded severely.

As an indication of the stringency of the examination which neutrals leaving Germany now undergo, a lady who recently arrived in Holland had her back rubbed with a lemon in order to wash off anything that might be written on it. All women have to undress and take down their hair, and all children, even infants in arms, are undressed and examined with the utmost thoroughness.

Several cases of blackmailing have been brought to the notice of the London authorities, in which the victims have been young army officers. The latter have been lured by beautiful young women to their flats, and then threatened with exposure by male accomplices. Rather than that their friends and relatives should be informed they have paid up. The blackmailers are said to form a gang and work hotels and music halls.

Thomas Bodkins of the counting-room force of the Asbestos Wood Company, Nashua, N.H., is now wearing a shaved head on account of paying an election forfeit prematurely. He backed Wilson with H. L. Manning, a fellow-clerk, who was to sacrifice his hair if Hughes was defeated. Bodkins was persuaded Wednesday morning, after reading the election headlines in a paper to pay the wager. He was soon sorry he did so and has since been growing more regretful of his haste. He is now drawing consolation from the hope that Manning will join him in the bald-headed state in a few hours.

A diplomat just returned from Norway states that the country, hitherto always poor, is enjoying unthought-of prosperity on account of fortunes made out of the war. He says that people formerly accustomed to tram cars are now falling over one another in their anxiety to buy expensive motor cars. No person, however, wishing to shine in the ranks of the real well-to-do class will adopt as the number of his car anything above 500, and is ready to pay a large sum of money to be given a registration number below this figure. Otherwise the appearance of his car in the street is met by the cry of "Parvenu!" from the street urchins around.

For the first time in history a Jew became a member of the Quebec Legislature last week. With hat on head and hand on the Old Testament, Mr. Peter Bercovitch, Liberal member for Montreal, St. Louis Division, took the oath, surrounded by French-Canadian and English-Canadian members, who saw such an oath administered for the first time. He received a cordial welcome from English-speaking and French-speaking members alike, belonging to both sides of politics. He was born in Montreal 37 years ago. His parents were immigrants from Warsaw, Poland. He was educated in the public schools of Montreal, and passed through McGill and Laval Universities.

What Stirred the Premier.

The correspondence which preceded the resignation of Sir Sam Hughes makes it quite clear that it was Sir Sam Hughes himself who brought matters to a climax. What we said yesterday is more than ever apparent from the correspondence now published—that it was only by personal affront to himself and to his own authority that the Premier was stirred to action. The small arms ammunition deal, the fuse contract revelations, the Camp Borden episode, and many other incidentals in connection with Sir Sam's administration were condoned by the Premier and action was only taken at last when Sir Sam practically put a pistol to Sir Robert Borden's head and demanded the appointment "within an hour" of Sir Max Aitken as "Minister of Overseas Forces," with Privy Council rank, in order that the said Sir Max should not be "humiliated and insulted" by the appointment, since gazetted, of Sir George Perley as Overseas Minister of Militia!
