Yesterday afternoon's sitting of the House of Assembly was featured by the first reading of the hardy annual and much agitated question—the Daylight Saving Bill. After the Minister of Finance tabled the Public Accounts for 1915-16 and Bills respecting Death Duties, Discipline on Ships controlled by the Admiralty, Returns of losses by Fire Insurance Companies and Contracts with the Riverside and Newfoundland Knitting Mills were introduced and read a first time, the debate on the motion for an Address in Reply was continued. The Rt. Hon. the Prime Minister concluded his remarks on the work of the Imperial Conference, presided over by Mr. Long, the British Colonial Secretary, the main matters discussed, the general feeling being that closer relationship by the colonies in all the policies of the Empire was imperative, especially as to its foreign relations. The matter of the graves o heroes who had died on foreign soil was also talked of at the Conference France has donated burial grounds to Britain and it is hoped sincerely that arrangements will be eventually findized with other European countries n order that the bodies of British oldiers will rest in British soil. 
