Word was received in town yesterday afternoon that a destructive fire swept Glenwood during the early morning which destroyed seventeen nouses, and rendered a number of people homeless. The only particulars received are that the fire originated through sparks from a chimney catching a neighbouring house, and with a strong westerly wind blowing all the adjoining houses were quickly on fire and destroyed, several of them with all their contents. Owing to the telegraph poles and wires being burnt and down it was impossible up to last night to get the names of those who had lost property, or the number of people rendered homeless.
