FOG HOLDS UP SHIPPING.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27. With six warships and more than a dozen inbound freighters still fog bound to-night off Sandy Hook, the local weather Bureau predicts that the misty curtain rolled down last Friday, will not be lifted for another 24 hours.

ETNA RESPONSIBLE.

LONDON, Sept. 27. A violent earthquake is reported to have occurred at Giarre, Sicily, according to a Rome despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. Giarre lies at the base of Mount Etna. The quake lasted ten seconds. One village was destroyed and many persons were injured.

FOR INVESTIGATION.

BOSTON, Sept. 27. The Fidelity Trust Company, one of the banks which invoked the 90 day clause covering the withdrawals of savings deposits to-day, will be taken over by the State Bank Commissioner at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning, according to a statement to-night by Commissioner Jos. C. Allen.

VISCOUNT CAVE AT TORONTO.

TORONTO, Sept. 28. Viscount Cave, noted British jurist, in an address to the Empire Club yesterday, alluded to the Imperial War Cabinet, and said he hoped this would become a real Imperial Cabinet. He said the ideal legal relations between Canada and Great Britain was that of consultation and advice, with perfect freedom of action.

PHYSICIAN'S STATEMENT.

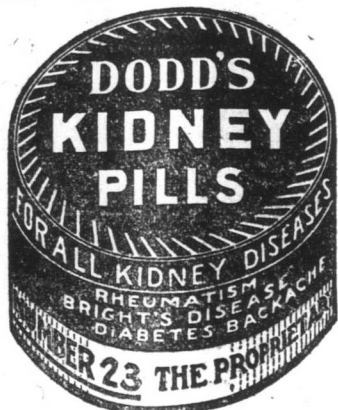
LONDON, Sept. 28. In a report to the Home Office the physician of Brixton prison said "MacSweeney is slightly thinner, but otherwise there is no marked change from yesterday. The prisoner is unquestionably growing weaker daily."

SEIZED ROYAL ESTATES.

LONDON, Sept. 28. Estates, owned by King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, at Santa Maria, near Naples, have been seized by members of the local Agricultural Societies, according to an Exchange Telegraph Company despatch. No opposition was offered to the seizure of the property.

CAPTURED BOLSHEVIST COMMISSARY.

WARSAW, Sept. 28. Polish cavalry, operating in the rear of retreating Bolsheviks, have reached a point north of Lida, says an official statement. Yesterday the Poles captured thirteen hundred prisoners, including a Bolshevik Commissary, and took eight cannon. The Russians



are retreating along the entire front but offering a stubborn resistance.

SEMI-OFFICIAL LYNCH LAW.

LONDON, Sept. 28. Serious anxiety over recurrence of "Black and Tan" reprisals in Ireland is reflected by English newspapers, which sharply call the government to halt, what is described by the Times as "Semi-official Lynch Law."

Schooner Roy Bruce put into Burin from Sydney, coal laden to St. John's. Schooner Olive Moore cleared from St. Anthony for Malaga with 5,140 qtls. Labrador codfish, shipped by A. E. Hickman & Co.

Schooner "Kristine" is at Catalina ready to load new dry fish for Spain, from P. Templeman.
