For the victors Billie Gossie poled out two beauties, the first one was a three bagger, which struck the fence far off in left field, while a pretty two base hit in the sixth innings cleaned up the sacks. Canning also contributed two safeties, one of which was good for three sacks. Joe Murphy, moundman for the Cubs, pitched faultless ball throughout the whole game, and was greatly backed up by his team mates in the field. The Wanderers only runs were scored in the third and last innings, Gabriel being responsible for the last counter by a clever piece of stealing. Messrs. Chessman and Thomas controlled the game. The next league match will be played between the B.I.S. and the Lions on Thursday evening, which will finish the last game of the second round.

LAST RELIC OF NEWFOUNDLAND'S NAVY CHANGES HANDS.

For some time past the Government has been negotiating for the disposal of S. S. Lobelia. It is reported that a sale has been effected but the price is not stated. The ship is at the premises of Bowring Bros. and it is generally believed that the firm has bought the gift. The Lobelia was given as a present to the Government by the Imperial authorities. Since arriving here very little use has been found for her, excepting last year when the Shipping Department fitted her up to convey crews from Labrador.

Police Court.

A resident of Salmonier who was charged with stealing the sum of \$11.80 from a house on Pleasant Street and also a sweepstake ticket from another place was sent down on remand until to-morrow.

A young man, resident of Holloway Street, charged with beating and assaulting a girl, was not tried as a witness for the prosecution is out of town. On request of Superintendent O'Neill, the trial was postponed for a week. Meanwhile the prisoner is to receive medical examination touching on his mental condition. Mr. J. G. Higgins appeared for the defence.

Two laborers of the city charged with the larceny of 8 pairs of boots from Parker & Monroes, were sent down for 8 days on remand. One of the prisoners had two other charges preferred against him viz stealing tobacco and cigarettes to the value of \$105 on different occasions. Both prisoners pleaded not guilty to any of the charges. A Russian who is supposed to be implicated in these robberies is still at the penitentiary on remand.

SALVAGE SHIP AT WRECK.

In response to Mr. J. J. Collins' enquiry in re the crew of the Raleigh the operator at Point Amour sent the following message yesterday: "Rumor your message in error. My message right. None left of the crew of the Raleigh. No further developments yet." This morning Mr. Collins received a further message saying, "Crew, except 100, left by S.S. Montrose yesterday. The ship is still resting easily. The salvage steamer Lord Strathcona is at the wreck this morning. Weather fine and calm." The Lord Strathcona is owned by the Davie Reckoning and Salvage Co. of Lewis, Quebec. She was built at South Shields in 1902, and is 76 tons net, 495 gross.
