Mussolini Works 18 Hours a Day.

Benito Mussolini, the man who, 38 years of age, has become virtually the legal dictator of Italy, has a great capacity for work. Since he assume. charge of the ministries of foreign affairs and the interior. Mussolini has averaged over 18 hours of hard work every day. At his desk promptly at the stroke of 8, he is still busy at midnight attending to the business of the two most important ministries in his government.

During the eighteen months which he was engaged in the organization of the Fascismo movement culminating in the peaceful entrance of a hundred thousand of his followers into Rome, Oct. 31st., Mussolini worked an average of 12 hours every day, including Sundays.

Mussolini cats little and drinks less. He sleeps about five or six hours out of the twenty-four. His beverage is a light Italian wine with about 50 per

cent. of water added. His favorite recreations are fencing and walking, and he is said to be a

chess player of no mean ability. Italy's man of the hour was an enthusiastic advocate of his country's entrance into the world war on the side of the Allies. He served as a corporal until wounded so severely, that he had to be sent to the rear as unfit for further active service. It is said that his body bears the scars of 120 wounds, caused by shell splinters and shrapnel.


