o be permanent, forest destruction must give way to timber culture,' William B. Greeley, Chief of the Forest Service said in his annual report made on Tuesday to the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture in which some illuminating figures anent the industry are given. In 1922 this country used 8,-000,000 tons of paper—more than half the world consumption—and of this quantity 1,000,000 was imported. Moreover, of the 9,000,000 cords of pulp wood manufactured in the United States that year, only five million cords were grown here. Mr. Greeley estimates that by 1950 the paper industry in this country will require 15,000,000 cords of wood annually, and the report indicates that the problem now actually presents itself of how to procure enough wood to keep the industry going.
