There were four lifebeats on her, but the flames prevented more than two being launched. They only succeeded in saving 22 persons. The purser was saved. He says there must have been 14 lost. Amongst the missin; is Capt. Carmichael; the chief engineer, Mr. Finncane, of Prescott; the steward, Wm. Spence of Lachine; also, three-lady passengers, Mrs. Sibbald and daughter, of Brockville; Miss Ireland, of Kingston; and Mr. Hillyard Wear, of Chatham. The names of the otherslost are unknown at present. Those that were saved arrived at this port about twelve o'clock, and received every attention which lay in the power of Mr. J. O. Guy, the Harbour-master.

The purser, Mr. L. A. McPherson, gives The Globe the following statement with respect to the catastrophe:—

We left Toronto on We loesda; afternoon at five o'clock. When off Ushawa and about fifteen miles from shore a fire broke out amidships and the boat was almost immediately in a mass of flames. Three boats were lowered, one of which drifted away before any one got into it. It was not blowing hard at the time. The other two boats reached land in safety about one o'clock his morning. One of them was commanded by the first mate, John Henderson, of Charlotte, N. Y., and contained thirteen persons, two of whom were passengers and the rest members of the crew. The passengers were J. J. Parmenter, Toronto, and Master James Finucane, the watchman, two firemen, L. Lecont, wheelsman, Wm. Merchiston and John Revere, watters, a mess room boy, a deek hand, whose name I do not know, and Henderson and myself. The other boat was commanded by the pilot, a Frenchman, whose first name is Napoleon, and

ladies' maid, Ann Gerraghty; and John McGowan, freman. The names of the others I do not know.

There were fourteen persons left aboard the steamer who could not get off. The flames spread so quickly that it was almost impossible to do anything. One of the small boats was scorched, and one of the mates got his face burnt. Amongst those lost are the captain, Charles Carmichael, of Toronto; the chief engineer, William Finucane, of Prescott; the steward, William Spence, of Lachine, formerly of Kingston; Mrs. Sibbald and daughter of Brockville; Miss Irsland, of Kingston, who was returning home from Chatham, where she had been seeing her ter of Brockville; Miss Ireland, of Ringston, who was returning home from Cuatham, where she had been seeing her brother, and Mr. Hillyard Wear, of Chatham, who had been travelling with her. There was very little screaming or anything of that sort, but when we were leaving the steamer I heard something like moaning. Some one said that they saw two women standing on her stern. The last I saw of Capt. Carmichael he was in the water holding on to a plank. He called out "Charley, Charley, Charley," to the second mate, and we went over to him; a bov who was near him then got hold of the boat, and while we were pulling him in the captain seemed to paddle away from us, and we lost him. Some one said that he had a life preserver, but it is not likely he lived long, the water was so cold. A tug was towing the hull of the steamer into Whitby this morning when I left. She had on board about 1,300 barrels of apples, about 50 tons of bacon, and a small quantity of other freight when she was burned.

The Bavarian was the old steamer Kingston rebuilt. The Kingston, it will be recoliected, was burned in the St. Lawrence a year ago last June, and her hull being of iron it was used in the construction of the Bavarian. The latter was put on the lake and river route on the first of last July. She was a very fine boat, valued at about \$80,000. She was insured against fire to the amount of about \$40,000 or \$45,000.
