BECKER MADE AS MUCH MONEY AS A SUCCESSFUL SUBDIVISION PROMOTER

EW YORK, August 13 .- Inprofits of Police Lieutenant Charles Becker while selling "pro tection" to gamblers is in the hands of District Attorney Whitman. Becker, according to this infor-mation, received money so fast that

he made maximum deposists in many savings banks, foing from one to another rather than starting a checking account in a bank at which he could deposit all of his illicit earnings. Although his salary was only \$2,-250 a year, Becker made five \$3,000

deposits in savings bank within thirty days after he took command of the "Strong Arm Squad." Each deposit was \$3,000 because that is the maximum allowed any one de-Mrs. Becker is said to have de-

posited \$12,000 of this money. The other \$3,000 was deposited by Becker himself. Realizing that the police graft "system" is powerless to aid him, Becker is reported today to be al-most in a state of collapse in the Tombs. He is said to be ready to graft if District Attorney Whitman that he be sent to the electric chair if he is convicted of having ordered
