ALLAN AND C. P. R. LINES MAY FORM BIG MERGER

Canadian Pacific Has 69 Ships, and
Allan Line 25.

London, Sept. 17.—The Liverpool cor-
respondent of The Daily Telegraph
wires that there is little doubt re-
ported in shipping circles that reports
of the fusion of the steamship lines of
H. and A. Allan and the Canadian Pa-
cific Railway will shortly be fully just-
ified.

It is understood that the Canadian
mail contract is now safely assured to
the joint concern, which, in its com-
bined form, will enjoy the closest rela-
tions with the Dominion Government.
Recent figures credit the Canadian Pa-
cific Railway with a total tonnage of
12,000, comprising 69 ships. The Allan
Line is credited with 25 ships, totaling
180,000 tons. The combination would
therefore include 94 ships of 378,000
tons, ranking eighth in the world.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Henry E. Allott,
known through the Middle West as
"Bunk" Allen, circus man, theatrical
promoter, saloon keeper, and member
of the old-time Chicago gamblers
syndicate, is dead at his home here.

As a saloon keeper he was best
known as the proprietor of the "Blue-
bird of Blood" saloon in the West Side
tenderloin.

As a circus man he was given credit
for being the originator of red lemon-
ade. The story is told that he was
discovered accidentally. When 15 years
old he ran away with a circus and
secured the candy and lemonade con-
cession. While mixing a tub of the
lemonade he dropped some red coated
cinnamon candies in it and turned it
pink. The sales were better that day
and afterward the colored beverage
was a feature.

SIR GEO. REID DISCUSSES IMPERIAL FEDERATION

Says a Central Parliament of
the Empire is Out of the
Question

Opines That Canada and Aus-
tralia Should Not Attempt to
Alter Present Relationship

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 21.—Im-
perial federation was the chief topic
discussed by Sir George Reid, the
Australian high commissioner, at the
luncheon given in his honor by the
Canadian Club yesterday afternoon in
the refectory at Victoria park. Calm-
ly, and without resort to sarcasm, he
discussed a few of the many weak-
nesses of the vague suggestions which
have been made from time to time
for a central parliament of the em-
pire, and made it clear that neither
Canada nor Australia could possibly
benefit if attempts were made to
change the present relationship of the
overseas dominions to the empire.

"I confess," he said, "that I have
heard many splendid speeches favor-
ing the general suggestion, but so far
as I can discover not a single states-
man has ever formulated a plan for
imperial federation. Many of us can
make speeches, but to devise a plan
for such a federation which would be
satisfactory and workable is some-
thing far more difficult than speech-
making."

"What do we mean when we speak
of the British empire? Do we not,
as a general rule, have in mind the
British Isles, Canada, Australia and
South Africa, the countries self-gov-
erned by men of the white race? Na-
turally, these are in our thoughts,
but these are not the British empire,
for there are only the homes of 60,000,000
of the 420,000,000 of human beings who
are subjects of the British empire,
and the remaining 360,000,000 of our
fellow subjects belong to different
races and of different religion, and
represent a different civilization.

"Are all of these to be ignored? Would you leave out of your plans
the vast majority of British India,
And yet, on the other hand, India,
for instance, is considered to be
worthy to be admitted to a parliament
of the empire which is to deal with
the matters of tremendous importance,
surely it is only fair that she should
be permitted to manage her own af-
fairs. If, on the other hand, you say
that India should be shut out of any
such imperial parliament, do you think
that you would be adding to the peace
of the empire by refusing representa-
tion to this part of it, and granting
representation to Canada and Aus-
tralia, which refuse to admit East In-
dians within their boundaries?"

Have More Power Now
"I venture to suggest that Canada
and Australia have much more power
than they could possibly have if
now than they could possibly have if
they were represented in an imperial
parliament. Their voices now are
voices of authority, carrying great
weight. Contrast this condition with
that which would inevitably follow if
we were to change for representation
in an imperial parliament. To sim-
plify matters, we will suppose for the
moment that the 360,000,000 of
fellow subjects of other races have
been ignored, and the remaining 60,
000,000 of white people who are in
proportion, and on the basis of repre-
sentation proportionately, what share
of the governing of the empire would
be done by Canada and Australia? Further to simplify the matter and
bring it where we can all grasp it,
suppose we say that there is a cen-
tral parliament of sixty—one for each
million of the population. The British
Isles would have 45 members, Canada,
eight, and Australia five. Perhaps you
begin to realize now what it would
mean to part with your independent
voice, and to trust to the voices of eight
members in the house of 60. The
pretty plan is not working out so well
as you imagined it would."

Party Feeling
"Then, party feeling has to be taken
into consideration, for this would
inevitably arise. At present, no such
thing exists. One ministry follows
another in Canada, and in Australia,
and there is no suggestion of anything
but the most complete harmony in
the dealings of the dominions with
the Mother Land. The government
of Great Britain is dealing with two
great nations, not with members of
political parties. But if one of the
members of the eight or the five should
become a member of the ministry
probably opposed in policy to the views
of most of the other seven or the other
five, he would certainly consider that
he was entirely right, and they would
be equally positive that he was en-
tirely wrong. Over-imperial affairs
of vast importance and complexity
now hovers the spirit of true and real
imperialism, but then this broad spirit
would very soon be tarnished by the
play of personal ambition.

"Meanwhile, the Mother Country
does not come to you begging for
your help. You can stay out of her
quarrels if you wish, and her quarrels
are not your quarrels, and you are
not your fellow subjects of the British
Isles would not say it. Every pound
we spend to make the flag of British
imperialism fly over the whole world
is a pound spent to preserve, not only
peace for ourselves, but to preserve
peace and justice throughout the whole
world. We don't want to see that
power destroyed. Think, if a great
disaster should happen to the British
navy, how ready we should all be to
lead breadtroughs after the event. Let
us make such a calamity impossi-
ble. Let us make the flag of British
imperialism fly over the whole world,
alone to ours, do our duty to the dear
old Mother Land."

SECRET SERVICE MEN RUN DOWN OLD OFFENDER

Levy, Once Sentenced to be
Hanged, Wanted as a White
Slaver, Caught

Was Pardon by Gov. Hawley
of Idaho, Who Had Prose-
cuted Him

Portland, Ore., Sept. 21.—Caught in a net by government agents from Seattle and two Portland detectives, George Levy, once sentenced to be hanged for murder in Idaho, and sought as an international white slaver

by the entire United States secret service since June, was arrested today. He was found in a rooming house with two French women whom he brought here from Paris. William Fisher, United States immigration commis-
sioner of Seattle, who has had charge of the search on the Pacific coast, and William T. Bryan, a special agent from Seattle in which Bryan was charged of the prisoner, and the arrest was timed for their arrival.

Bryan was assigned to the case because he was well acquainted with Levy, having been a police officer in Boise, Idaho, at the time of his conviction there for murder. During the trial, in which Levy was convicted, he threatened to kill Bryan if ever freed. However, this morning when Levy was brought into a room in which Bryan was, he calmly confessed to bringing the women to this country from France, and said he expected to live on their earnings.

Levy first came to this country in 1909, and went to Boise. He became acquainted there with David Levy, a wealthy miser. Though the names are the same, the men were no relation. October 3, 1909, David Levy was found murdered in the other's room, and the Frenchman was convicted of the crime. Governor Hawley, of Idaho, then a lawyer in Boise, acted as special prosecutor, and it was through his efforts that Levy was convicted. But Levy's sentence was commuted by the then governor, and when Hawley became state executive he pardoned Levy in August, 1911, on condition that he leave this country forever.

After his pardon Levy went back to Paris, and there met Caroline Roberts, a French woman, with whom he had lived in Boise at the time of his arrest. It was through the complaint of Caroline Roberts, in New York, that the government officers were put on the track of Levy.

Smugglers Have Hard Time Now

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Sept. 17.—John Wilkie, chief of the U. S. secret service, in an interview here today declared that the rainy days of smuggling along the border were practically over now. With the assistance of the Dominion officials he said that smuggling had been reduced to a minimum, much to the satisfaction of honest importers on both sides of the frontier.

Bar Pictures of Suicide's Funeral

Chicago, Sept. 17.—Chief of Police McWeeney today stationed a man at the Pekin Theatre on the south side here to prevent the showing of moving pictures of the funeral of Mrs. Etta Durvay-Johnson, who shot herself in her husband's cafe last week.

Johnson had obtained a temporary injunction restraining the theatre from using the pictures, and the police censor has also barred them.

SISTER TO TITANIC TO BE REBUILT

Will Have Inner Skin and Additional Bulkheads

London, Sept. 21.—The White Star line has called off future sailings of the steamer Olympic, says the correspondent of the Chronicle at Southampton. He adds that on the return of the Olympic from New York early in October she will be sent to Belfast, where she will be fitted with an inner skin and additional bulkheads. This work, it is said, will occupy six months.
