THE ONTARIO REFORM CLUB—SIR RICHARD'S ADDRESS.

The annual meeting of the Ontario Reform Club at Toronto is usually a quiet affair, devoted mainly to routine. But inasmuch as it brings about an appeal to the country, which they do not fear, they intend to fight the Government on the plain lines of an honest, workable policy of extension of trade relations, as against the sham proposed by the Government, which cannot and is not intended to result in any good to the country, but only to deceive the country into a further term of vassalage to the combines.
