The popularity of the hall is attested by the fact that since it was opened, the corps has had larger congregations than for years gone by, and I confidently bespeak a magnificent winter campaign for the city. "Nor is this all. Not only has the corps

reaped the advantages of this transaction, but the Salvation Army as a whole. In addition to finding quarters for the Provincial assistant, the field officers, and the janitor, besides renting off other portions of the building, we have accommodation for what comprises, now it is fitted out, one of the neatest and best ordered food and shelter depots in the world.
