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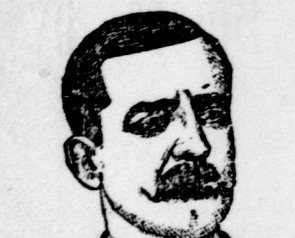

Wingham's Sensation.

Provincial Detective Rogers Appears on the Scene.

Summoning Witnesses for the London Inquest—Much Excitement.

Wingham, Ont., March 25.—The excitement over the Fields case is running very high. It is now over two weeks since the assault on Fields was committed, and those interested were beginning to think the authorities were not going to pay any attention to the matter. There was, however, a rude awakening yesterday, when Detective Rogers, of the Provincial Detective Department, appeared to subpoena witnesses to appear at the adjourned inquest to be held in London on March 31. Much uneasiness is felt by all interested, even by those who did not take part in the assault, but went as on-lookers.

When the assault was committed, the feeling here was that justice had been meted out to Fields. But when death occurred, a wave of horror swept over the community. Since then, however, a partial investigation of Fields' past life has been made, and many horrible stories of cruelty and immorality are being told, and some of the older citizens recall facts that had been forgotten. But it will require a thorough legal investigation to unravel the mystery.

Two of the ringleaders have left town, but it is supposed they can be easily found when they are required. The balance of those who are alleged to have taken part in the assault are apparently not making any attempt to leave. The difficulties which will face the detective are very great, as so many people were concerned in the affair, and, of course, all the citizens are acquainted to a certain extent with those engaged.

The farmers of the neighborhood take great interest in the case, and many of them drive long distances to obtain information about the case.

THAWED THE CARTRIDGES.

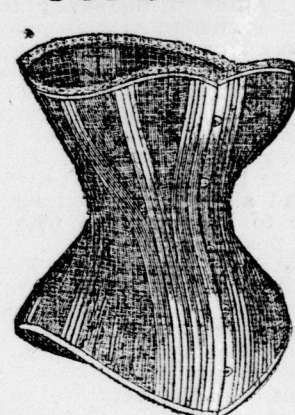
