From a Horrible Death.

ELGIN.

Early Tuesday morning thieves entered
Foster & Hobbs' hardware store, Tilson-
burg, by taking a pane of glass out of the
back window. They took four revolvers,
a quantity of No. 22 cartridges and some
jackknives, the total value of the articles
being \$25. The burglars went out through
the front door, leaving it open. The work
is evidently that of novices.

The Tilsonburg store factory was offered
for sale by public auction, and was pur-
chased by Messrs. Weston for the sum of
\$50 for buildings and the same amount for
patterns, the town still holding a mortgage
of \$3,000 on the property.

One day recently Mrs. A. N. C. Black, of
Dutton, was in the act of lifting a kettle
from the stove when the flames caught her
dress, a print one. In a moment Mr.
Black was enveloped in flames, which rose
about her head. Too terrified to act
calmly, she ran out of the open door,
where her son was standing. The young
man seized a pailful of water, dashed it
over her and then threw his arms around
her. His sister was also present, and the
two succeeded in extinguishing the flames,
but not before their hands were severely
burned. Mrs. Black's escape was miracu-
lous, the front of her dress being completely
destroyed.

A monster picnic was held on Thursday

MIDDLESEX.

A correspondent from near Byron
writes: A largely signed petition has
been gotten up both here and at Hynde
Park, asking the Rev. Mr. Diehl, Church
of England, to resign his charge in both
places. "The cause of this action," con-
tinues the correspondent, "arises from
some alleged heterodoxy on the part of the
pastor. He emphatically and repeatedly
denies the Scriptural authority for eternal
punishment, and he further asserts that
there is nothing in the articles or dogmas
of the Episcopal Church that teaches
eternal punishment. Quite a sensation
has been created in religious circles in
this and the Rev. Mr. Diehl has a great
many sympathizers in both the churches.
Several of both congregations in Byron and
Hynde Park have appealed to the Bishop of
Huron in the matter, and it is thought a
commission at an early day may be ap-
pointed to try the case and determine its
theological point.
