LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mr. D. S. Vernon, manager of the Vernon Jarboe Company, is in the city. Mrs. and Miss Vernon accompany him.

—Twenty-two new scholars were enrolled at the London West school one day this week, denoting quite an increase in the population of the electric railway suburb.

—The many friends of Mr. D. H. McKeenie will be glad to learn that he is recovering from a very severe illness, which has confined him to the house for a long time.

—Miss E. M. M. Leslie, of the Cleveland Press, is the guest of Mrs. Geo. F. Durand, en route to Omaha, where she goes on leave of absence from her post for rest and health.

—The statement that Hon. G. W. Ross will accept the magistracy of East Middlesex is incorrect. There is the best authority for saying that he has no intention of accepting the position.

—Miss Jessica F. Terwilliger, of Boston, whose efforts as an elocutionist in Toronto last season were widely admired, has been secured as instructor in expression and physical culture at the London Conservatory of Music. Miss Terwilliger is a past-graduate of the Emerson College of Oratory in the classic city.

—Mr. George Robinson was elected vice-president of the Western Ontario Bible Society yesterday, in the place of the late Sheriff Glass. Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., was elected a member of the general committee in the stead of Mr. Robinson, elected to the presidency.

—"Carthy To-Night." The "Rambler from Clare" will open a three nights' engagement to-night at the Grand. His previous success in this city will be remembered. The following is from a Brooklyn exchange: Dan McCarthy and his splendid company presented "The Rambler from Clare" before a very large and appreciative audience at Crockhite Opera House last evening. Mr. McCarthy, as Tony Sullivan, the rambler from Clare, was at his best, his singing and dancing were fine and he was obliged to answer to several encores. Miss Lily Holmes, as Rose Dwyer, Tony's sweetheart, was a great favorite with the audience, and is one of the cleverest of all Irish songwriters. Mr. Charles Saunders, as Paddy McFadden, kept the audience in a continual roar at every appearance. The remainder of the company were very good, and the evening throughout was far above the average.

—Encouraging Progress. Last Lord's Day was one of great rejoicing for the friends of Egerton Street Mission, being the opening of their new mission school room for the better accommodation of their Sunday school, which was started two years ago last June in a little cottage rented from H. McConnell. The school has had such encouraging success that the trustees felt warranted in going to the expense of this new building, 40x24, substantial frame, situated on the corner of Egerton street and Hamilton road, at which point six roads converge, making it a very desirable and accessible place for a public building. The dedication services consisted of an open school at 3 o'clock p.m., addressed by Pastors Mitchell, Adelaide Street Church, Walker, of London South Church, and Smith, of Talbot Street Church. The addresses were earnest and impressive. The opening sermon was preached by Pastor Mitchell at 7 p.m. There was also a concert on Monday at 8 o'clock p.m., conducted by Mr. A. Gorman, Miss Gorman and other leading talent of the city. The services were all that the most sanguine could desire, and the financial results were satisfactory. The house thus set apart will be used for Sunday school, commencing at 2:45 p.m. and evening preaching service at 7 p.m. each Lord's Day.

A cordial invitation is given to parents and children living in that neighborhood. Mr. G. F. Robertson, who is superintendent of the mission, referring to the opening services, says: "The good Lord smiled on us with his sunshine, and we believe the Holy Spirit was present to give effect to each service."

An Ulcer of Immortality. The corner of George and Grosvenor streets, so Mr. W. T. Hill asserted at a meeting of No. 3 committee last evening, while appealing for an electric light at that intersection, is one of the most immoral spots in the city. It was, he said, the rendezvous of tramps. He thought the evil would be greatly aggravated during the coming fair week, and was of the opinion that the light, in order to exterminate the "den of darkness," should be immediately placed. On motion of Ald. J. W. Jones the engineer will be instructed to prepare for the erection of the light.

Inspector Bell reported the collection of \$1,003 in licenses to date.

Messrs. William Bowman and William T. Gartley presented a petition asking that the block, bounded by the G. T. R. track, Bathurst, Richmond and Clarence streets, should be made exempt from the provisions of the fire limit bylaw.

The solicitor for these gentlemen, Mr. J. H. Flock, urged an acquiescence in the request. Mayor Eversley and Chairman Fitzgerald opposed this view. Aldermen Jones, Stevely and Heaman supported a motion to have the fire limit bylaw in accordance with the petitioners' wish. This will be recommended to the council.

A communication was read from U. Ward, a cripple and one-handed, who stated that he was unable to do heavy work and was the only support of a family, asking permission to sell small wares on the market. Clerk Wilson was asked to secure some information in regard to Ward. The opinion prevailed that if he was a deserving man the wish should be granted. The council will be requested to get the engineer to make Mr. John Sussex comply

with the provisions of the fire limit bylaw. He erected a frame building in the early part of the year and was given until the 1st of July to brick veneer it. This has not yet been done.

LAURIER'S RECEPTION.

His Greeting in London Was Warm and Cordial.

The Presentation in the Young Liberal Club Rooms—A Large Crowd Greeted the Chieftain—Those Who Were There.

After his arrival here at noon yesterday, the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier was driven around the city and environs in company with Charles S. Hyman, M.P., and Mr. J. S. Willison, editor of the Globe, Toronto. Mrs. Laurier was not with the party, she having gone on to Windsor on leaving London. Hyman entertained his guests at the London Club and at 3:30 p.m. the party drove around to the Young Liberal Club rooms, in the Oddfellows' Block, where a reception was held for an hour. During that time a constant stream of citizens were presented to the Liberal chieftain, whose natural grace and distinguishing personality made a decided impression on the callers. Several gray and grizzled followers of the old guard waited in the hallway for three-quarters of an hour before the object of their visit arrived. When the great Liberal statesman came, and they were in due time presented, they immediately afterwards fell to comparing notes in the ante-room. "I would not have missed it if the thrashing had waited for a week instead of a day," said one. "What the others had to say was inaudible, but as they were passing down the stairs, the chief spoke up to his neighbors with the information that Mr. Laurier was indeed wonderfully like his "picture."

The rooms were tastefully decorated, while a guard of honor from the Young Liberal Club was present. Two of the latter were stationed at each place of entrance and exit. Each guard held an upturned car with the ever-lacking red appearance of the guard, and made them look quite sailor-like. The young men who occupied the posts of honor were Capt. Art Magee, Seamen P.
