Winnipeg, May 11 .- Sir Charles Tupper was so anxious to get back to Ottawa, where a number of offices are to be parceled out, that he started on Sunday afternoon. A few personal friends saw him off. Grossly exaggerated reports of his reception here have from the truth than to say that there was what might be called an outburst of popular enthusiasm at the depot on the arrival of Sir Charles. PRISON REFORMS. London, May 11.-Many people may be surprised to learn that by order of the Home Secretary, the principle of separating juvenile offenders in prisons from adults is for the first time officialy affirmed in England. To some extent it has already been adopted in practice, but hereafter it is to be the universal rule. Unfortunately, as the laws stand, 16 is now the age limit, beyond which offenders become adults, so this administrative reform misses altogether a large class of youths who
