Former Winnipeg Conservatives on the Demonstration.

Tupper Has Done More Harm Than Good by His Visit.

A Liberal Sweep in Manitoba Condemned Predicted.

Winnipeg, May 11.-Sir Charles Tupper was so anxious to get back to Ottawa, where a number of offices were to be opened, that he started on Sunday afternoon. A few personal friends saw him off. Grossly exaggerated reports of his reception here have been telegraphed to eastern high-tail journals. Nothing could be further from the truth than to say that there was what might be called an outbreak of popular enthusiasm at the depot on the arrival of Sir Charles. It was with great difficulty that a stranger to Winnipeg, Mr. W. McDonald, of the Conservative party, could raise a cheer for the Premier, notwithstanding that thousands of people had congregated for the purpose of gratifying curiosity and looking at the man. The statement that there were 5,000 people walking in the procession in the middle of the street is simply a plain falsehood. There were not a dozen people, nor half a dozen, in the procession as it moved past the postoffice, less than five-cents of a man from the depot and on route to the Manitoba Hotel.
