### VENEZUELAN SITUATION HAS TAKEN A GRAVE TURN

Report of Bombardment of San | out to the foreign offices at London, Carlos Has Been Received at Berlin.

Maracaibo, Jan. 22.-The bombardment of Fort San Carlos by the German cruisers Vineta, Panther and Falke was continued yesterday afternoon until 6 o'clock, and was resumed this morning until daybreak.

TRIED TO LAND TROOPS. The first two vessels at a range of four and a half miles poured in a continuous rain of shell upon the fort and only stopped firing with the advent of dusk at 6 o'clock. At this hour the German vessels retired seaward after making a second ineffectual attempt to land troops in the Village of San Carlos, at the base of the fort. Beilin, Jan. 23.—A report of the bombardment of Fort San Carlos, Venezuela, was received at the navy department at noon today, but it is being communicated to the imperial chancellor before being published. The foreign office has not received any representations from United States

Secretary Hay, relative to the bom-

bardment.

Washington, Jan. 22.-A cablegram rom Mr. Russell, American charge at Caracas, confirms the report to the effect that three German warships began to bombard Fort San Carlos yes-The dispatch does not indicate the result of the bombardment, and, in fact, contains no other detail. There is a singular reticence on the part of the state department officials suddenly developed in connection with the Venezuelan situation, and especially with reference to the German bombardments, which may be significant of the gravity with which they view the situation. There is no longer any talk of exerting friendly influences to prevent these bombardments, but it is difficult for the de-

Hamilton's Best Men Get \$2.10 Per Day; London's Get \$1.90.

The City of Hamilton has increased the pay of its 51 policemen by 20 cents a day. This applies to every member of the force, including Chief Smith, and the total increased cost to the city will be \$3,723. This means that the best men on the force will now get \$2 10 per day, hitherto they having been paid \$1 90 per day, which is the same as paid the best men in London, the wages for the men here running from \$1 45 to \$1 90 per day. Here the force of 41 men last year managed to keep the law in authority at a cost, including necessary expenditures for the department, of \$33,000, while it cost the City of Hamilton last year \$50,000. Nevertheless the increase in the Ambitious City was urged by 300 petitioners, backed by a delegation to the board of police commissioners.



Raleigh's Great Oil Gushers. A Second Big Flow Struck Near the First One. FIVE PAYING WELLS.

Fields Expected To Have Permanent Value-Oil Is of Spiendid Quality and a Good Illuminant—The Work Now Under Way.

Chatham, Jan. 10 .- A little over two months ago Chatham was startled by the news that in Raleigh Township, eight miles south of the city, an oil gusher had been struck that gave the phenomenal flow of 1,000 barrels a day. After the first month much had been done toward the establishment of what is expected one day to be a permanent oil field, and the discovery of more oil during the past week has started another stir. Four new paying wells have been struck since the Gurd Gusher. These, however, represent but a small amount of the work that is in progress. Early in November there was no sign of the present industry; today the farms in the neighborhood are dotted with derricks and little neighboring sheds that cover boilers and engines.

#### ANOTHER BIG GUSHER.

The Gurd Gusher was the first strike, and ITS LARGE YIELD KEEPS IT TODAY THE BIGGEST OF THE FIELD. Yesterday afternoon, how-ever, a good strike was made, which would be considered a wonderful find if it had not to compare with the Gusher. Coryell and Gage struck oil last week on Lot 22, Concession 13, the well was "shot" in the afternoon, and after the operation produced a flow that will yield 25 barrels an hour.
