

RUSSIANS DRIVEN NO RELIEF ARMY FROM YIN KOW FOR PORT ARTHUR

3,000 Troops With 20 Guns Russians Say Stakeberg Is Evacuated the City.

FOUR RUSS DESTROYERS CHASED 200,000 MORE FOR KUROPATKIN

Togo Finds Them at Talienvan and Reserves in All Parts of European Russia Being Hurriedly Mobilized.

Tokio, June 13, 7 p.m. — A long report has been received here from Admiral Togo, in which he covers the operations of the fleet since June 6, and repeats his former account of the bombardment of the west coast of the Liaotung Peninsula.

Continuing the admiral says that the captain of a foreign vessel that left Yinkow on Wednesday, June 8, reported that the recent Japanese bombardment in the vicinity of Kaiping, south of New Chang, caused the Russian forces to the number of 3,000, with twenty guns, to evacuate Yinkow. Two men who were taken prisoners by the Japanese, and later released, reported that the Russian forces, numbering in all about 5,000 men, arrived recently at Manchalia, Yafangow and Yafandien. The prisoners say also that numbers of Russian troops are coming south from Mukden every day.

On Wednesday, June 8, a detachment of the fleet bombarded and dispersed two companies of Russian troops, who were on Kaiping Point. On Friday another detachment of the fleet bombarded the enemy for two hours near Yinkow and Talienvan, inflicting much damage on them.

Another detachment of the Japanese fleet, according to Admiral Togo's report, discovered four Russian torpedo boat destroyers in Talienvan Bay near Shaopingtan, and sank them by the use of their torpedoes. Over seventy mines have been destroyed in Talienvan Bay. Thirty floating mines have been found and destroyed. Some of these were drifting into Pechili Gulf.

In conclusion, the admiral says a deep fog which prevailed for several days finally cleared away on Sunday.

GLOOM AT PORT ARTHUR

Garrison Hoping Kuropatkin Will Attempt a Rescue.

New Chang, June 13, 6 a.m. — A Japanese man who was smuggled by the Chinese into Port Arthur to act as a spy and escapee, was captured last night. He told a correspondent of the Associated Press that the Japanese were working a large force of men day and night repairing the warships. They expect that they will be completed in a fortnight. Four cruisers under Golden Hill (at the entrance of Port Arthur) have been trained landward. The Japanese are repulsing a land attack. The channel is partly closed. Admiral Togo's blockade is effective. The total strength of the Russian forces, including the sailors, at less than thirty thousand men. There are many sick and wounded. There is food sufficient for two months. All the Chinese foodstuff has been seized by the authorities.

Two armored trains on board of which are mounted guns landed from the Russian battleship Bogatyr, recently ran to a point near the Japanese lines and opened fire. The Japanese replied and their shells badly damaged the train, though it managed to return to the Russian lines. The Russians at Port Arthur are gloomy, though they are confident that Kuropatkin will send an army south to assist the garrison of Port Arthur.

BRUTAL CHINESE BANDITS

Liao Yang, June 14.—Ensign Marloff, who has returned from the battle of Shimoda, fought on June 7, says that the Japanese lost about 300 men. He speaks in the highest terms of the work of the two Red Cross doctors who attended the wounded under fire. When the order came to retire these doctors refused to leave the bandaging until the last of the wounded were brought in and attended to. After the battle a wounded Russian was found with his tongue out and his fingers severed. There is a general disinclination to attribute the mutilation to the Japanese after the kindness which had previously been shown to the Russian wounded, and it is thought to be more probable that it is the work of Chinese bandits. It is alleged that during the engagement the Japanese agents used the Red Cross by getting within 400 yards under its cover before they fired.

SAVED THE COLORED.

Moscow, June 12. — Six of the survivors of the battleship Petropavlovsk arrived here today. Among them is the sailor Gorichenko, who saved the vessel's flag. Gorichenko was the last man on the ship when it was sinking, and he stayed inside his shirt, after which he leaped overboard. Passing through Mukden, Gorichenko was granted an audience by Viceroy Alexieff, who presented him with the St. George's Cross.

PORT ARTHUR BADLY DAMAGED

New Chang, June 13. — Admiral Togo is stopping many native boats attempting to land foodstuffs near Port Arthur. Forty-two junk boats, one of which was sent to Tung Chou Foo. The Chinese guilds are petitioning Lieut.-General Stoessel (the commander of the Russian military force at Port Arthur) to permit their members to leave. A flour mill belonging to Chi Feng Tai, the richest Chinaman in Port Arthur, is grinding wheat which is still at Port Arthur. An enormous amount of grain was destroyed by the Japanese shells. The Russo-Chinese bank is totally destroyed. The coal supply at Port Arthur is low. It is estimated at only 2,400 tons of Cardiff, and 3,000 tons of Japanese coal.

KUROPATKIN REPORTS.

General Kuropatkin's headquarters in the field, June 12. — According to information here the only hostilities now occurring at the front are daily encounters between the front and the rear corps are up to the front every day. A few Russian prisoners are being brought into Japanese headquarters. The Japanese are being captured. This is taken to show that the Japanese are getting the best of the encounter. Twelve Members of a Suicide Club Have Destroyed Themselves.

New York, June 14.—George Wagner, a wealthy and prosperous German and proprietor of a hotel in Bridgeport, Conn., committed suicide in the Morton House Sunday night by shooting. He was 60 years of age.

His wife, Mrs. Wagner, 52, was also a member of the suicide club. Later on, one after another of the congenial spirits began to die by suicide. That gave rise to the report that there was a suicide club in Bridgeport. Practically all of the men who were formerly identified with the "organization" died by their own act. There is said to be one member left, who is a jeweler here.

MAY VACATE WEI HAI WEI

Should Port Arthur Fall Great Britain's Lease Would Expire.

London, June 14. — It appears from a question asked in the House of Commons today that the fall of Port Arthur will mark the end of British tenancy of Wei Hai Wei on the Shantung peninsula. The British ambassador in Peking today informed the House that under the Anglo-Chinese convention of 1898 "the British lease of this Chinese port was only valid so long as Port Arthur remained in the occupation of Russia."

WILL SACRIFICE A MILLION MEN

Czar Is Now Confident That He Will Ultimately Triumph.

London, June 14.—The correspondent of the Times at Vienna says: The Polish Czar, which is usually well informed on affairs regarding the Russian court, publishes today a communication from St. Petersburg on the state of mind of the Czar. The rumors, which represent the Emperor as downcast and doubtful of the issue of the war, are, says the Czar, no longer in accordance with truth. Emperor Nicholas, on the contrary, is full of confidence in the army and its ultimate success. His advisers, he says, will date from the day he passed in reviewing the troops starting for the front.

RESERVES CALLED OUT.

Petrovsk, Russia, June 14.—The partial mobilization of the reserves in this district has been proclaimed. Two thousand men are wanted from here.

A COSSACK HERO.

Liao Yang, June 14.—Two wounded Cossacks, each wearing the Cross of St. George, have arrived here. They tell a thrilling story of the fight near Peking. One of the Cossacks, named Nicholas, was wounded in the chest, and when about five miles from Peking they were suddenly surprised by the Japanese. The Cossacks charged with lance, and were met with a volley from the Japanese, which resulted in the death of 20 horses, the killing of two Cossacks and the wounding of six. Dismounted Cossacks fought behind the fallen horses' shields. With nearly every horse in the command carrying two men, the Cossacks charged three times, and though covered with wounds, they cut their way out and rejoined the militia.

The women of the villages, who disappeared during the massacres have been recovered by their husbands, but most of the girls have not been seen since.

It is difficult to believe that the internal condition of that unhappy country can be much prolonged without a crisis of some sort. It is a land literally broken up as a test, and plunders. To such a pass have matters come that nothing is held sacred. The crowning audacity has just been shown. The Czarina, the Queen of Denmark, the Queen of England and other royal personages recently equipped a hospital train at St. Petersburg. It was fitted with every requisite for the comfort of the sick and wounded, and was dispatched with every box of supplies carefully secured with the imperial seals.

On the two days 73 villages were destroyed, and of a population of 5,000, 2,000 were massacred. The women of the villages, who disappeared during the massacres have been recovered by their husbands, but most of the girls have not been seen since.

THE NIAGARA CAMP

Five Thousand Men Expected to Take Part This Year.

Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont., June 14.—The annual military camp of instruction opened here today, and will continue until the 24th inst. It is estimated that the different corps are up to their full strength, to be one of the largest camps held here in some years. Col. Omer D. G. C. N. 2, will be in command. Up to now very few troops had arrived beyond a few advance parties, but by tonight it is expected that 5,000 men will be under canvas. The tents have been all pitched and everything is ready to begin the actual work of training tomorrow morning.

KILLED HIS SON

Father Mistook Him for Highwayman and Stabbed Him to Death.

Mount Holly, N. J., June 14. Frank Reincke, aged 16 years, was killed last night by his father while trying to play a joke on the latter. Young Reincke hid in the bushes along the highway, and when his father approached, the boy jumped out, expecting to scare him. The elder Reincke drew a knife and plunged it into the boy's heart, killing him almost instantly. Mr. Reincke thought he was about to be attacked by a highway man. The father is almost insane from grief.

REFUSED TO PAY THE POLL TAX

Italians at Sydney, C. B., Will Be Prevented From Leaving the Country.

Sydney, N. S. W., June 13.—The entire police force of this city have been ordered to report for duty today to prevent the departure of a crowd of Italian immigrants, who intend to leave for the United States by the early express. The police have been trying to collect poll tax from most of these men for the past week, and nearly all have refused to pay it. Yesterday was the day at the wash plant, where the Italians are employed, when the police tried to make them pay. They refused to do so, and the police are making preparations for a clash.

112 MILES, 101 MINUTES

Fast Time of Special in Race Against Death.

Marshalltown, Ia., June 14.—Elias Kemper, of New York, yesterday made a vain attempt on a special train to reach his dying brother in Denver before death came. He received a telegram from his brother, who was dying, and he set out on a special train. The train was delayed by a strike of the strikers' association, stationed near the gate with his camera. In this way they hope to prevent the strikers from getting work in union workshops, factories or mines where they may apply. As regards the strike, the men affected by the strike as well as the public generally, appear to be waiting for Mr. Plummer's arrival before any important developments occur.

CONSERVATIVES RAISE RACE CRY

The Opposition Organ at Ottawa Stirring Up Strife.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Ont., June 14.—The next political campaign will be fought by the Conservatives on race and religion. Another great effort is being made to stir up strife and discord among the people in the main hope of getting power. The local opposition organ has got an inspired article this morning against the "Irish" Frenchmen who hold Sir Wilfrid in power, and who, according to the C. P. M., are getting all the patronage. When the French Conservatives in the day of Sir John Macdonald held the Government, it was a different question. In those days French Canadians were patriots and now they are described as "traitors." This was no one, as it has been "tried too often."

THE ASCOT STAKES.

London, June 14.—Ascot week opened today. King Edward, Queen Alexandra and the Prince of Wales, accompanied by a large party, arrived in state from Windsor Castle, and met with a great reception at the course.

The Ascot stakes (a handicap of 20 sovereigns each, with 2,000 sovereigns added; two miles), the principal race of the day, began at 3 o'clock. The favorite, Andrew won. Pure Gold was second, and Pradella was third.

THREATENED MILNER.

Johnannesburg, Transvaal, June 14.—Three foreigners supposed to be agents of the Transvaal government, who were arrested here during the night. One of the men had been heard to boast that he would attempt to assassinate the British high commissioner, Lord Milner, if it was made worth his while.
