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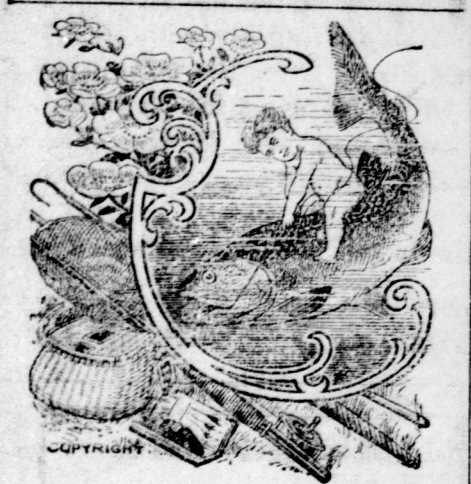

pure as it is possible to obtain anywhere. It is all right now, and it will continue to be found all right. As a professional man, and an officer of the village, I am quite ready to make this statement, and I am also ready to prove that everything that it is possible to do to purify the water supply, and to maintain its purity, has been done by the village of Port Stanley. Consequently, I have no hesitation in saying that there is not the slightest danger to anyone in the water supply here.

Dr. Mothersill then went on to say that as the ice which is now being used in London was cut on the north branch of the Thames—a source which has been declared to be impure—he has refused to allow the ice to be placed in the drinking water of the city of Port Stanley for fear it would contaminate the supply.

"I have stopped the Pere Marquette using the London ice," he said, "and I do not propose to allow it to be used this summer here."

A Thrust at London.
Then Dr. Mothersill launched into a new line of argument which is of the utmost importance to the city of Port Stanley. He declared that the people of London have been misled, and that they have been misled regarding the outbreak of typhoid fever last summer.

"I have information furnished me that the use of river water in London, I found that there is an intake pipe from the reservoir of one of the Port Stanley collecting ponds, to the river, so that in case of emergency river water could be taken back on to fill the reservoir. What would the people of London think if it were proven to them that they drank river water last summer when the water in the reservoir was low? We believe they did drink river water, and I have had eight photographs of the reservoir and its surroundings, showing the collecting ponds and the intake pipe made, and these will be sent to the Provincial Board of Health at once.

Writ Against Dr. English.
I have also instructed our solicitor, Mr. W. K. Cameron, of St. Thomas, to issue a writ against Dr. English, chairman of the London Board of Health, claiming unstated damages on the part of the corporation of the village of Port Stanley through a statement made by Dr. English, in which he said nothing had been done by the people of the village to improve the water supply since last summer.

We asked Dr. English to retract this statement, but he refused. Dr. Mothersill continued, "and now we propose to make him take it back."
The doctor also pointed out that half a dozen wells in the village had been closed up, and that all the others had been thoroughly cleaned and refitted with new curbs and the like.

That the people of Port Stanley are well looked up over the aspersions which have been cast upon the water there, is evident everywhere. Yesterday Mr. H. M. Douglas, president of the Fraser House, informed The Advertiser that he has instructed Messrs. McVey & Perrin, his solicitors in this city, to bring suit against the London Free Press for \$10,000 damages. He claims that he had his place sold, and that certain articles which appeared in the Free Press, and which he declares were libelous, "queered" the sale, and the purchaser backed out, leaving their deposit in his hands.

It is said also that a vigilance committee is "laying" for Dr. English. At the Port Stanley people declare that he will be "huked" in Kettle Creek the minute he appears at Port Stanley, as he is blamed for the troubles of the people.

M. H. O. In Bad Odor.
Dr. Hutchinson is also in bad odor at the lakeside. It is said that the other day he took his yacht to the Nancey, up to Port Bruce, fearing that the people at Port might do the boat harm, but the Port Bruce residents refused to allow the yacht to be docked there, and the doctor found it necessary to take her all the way to Port Huron.
