A Thrust at London. Then Dr. Mothersill launched into a new line of argument which is of the utmost importance to Londoners. "Through the action of the chairman of the London Board of Health," he said, "it has devolved upon Port Stanley to prove its innocence regarding polluted water. We believe the people of London have been misled, and I think before long we will be able to prove that they have been misled regarding the outbreak of typhoid fever last summer.

"Certain information furnished me led me to make investigations regarding the use of river water in London. I found that there is an intake pipe from the reservoir or one of the collecting ponds, to the river, so that in case of emergency river water could be fallen back on to fill the reservoir. What would the people of London think if it were proven to them that they drank river water last summer when the water in the reservoir was We believe they did drink river water, and I have had eight photo-graphs of the reservoir and its surroundings, including the collecting ponds and the intake pipe made, and these will be sent to the Provincial

Board of Health at once.
