\$100,000,000 NEW LOAN CONCERN TO FINANCE REBUILDING 'FRISCO

New York, May 16 - The Herald today says: It was determined yesterday that \$100,000,000 shall be the capitalization of the new mortgage loan corporation, which is to be organized here to advance money for the rebuilding of San Francisco. The promoters of the enterprise at first argued that \$10,000,-000 capitalization would provide an ample vehicle for handling hundreds of millions of investments, but it was found that San Francisco favored a much larger capitalization than the \$10,000,000 at first proposed, thus giving opportunity for investment by the Pacific coast. Plans for the perfecting of the huge corporation will be adopted today, and it is now expected that all of the preliminaries will be completed this week, and the work of advancing \$100,000,000 or more for the reconstruction of the destroyed city will begin within thirty days.
