

COMMITTEE MET LONDON ELECTRIC

But Nothing Was Done Pending
the Arrival of President
Matthews of Toronto.

AND ADJOURNED SINE DIE

Manager Hunt Explained That He
Wanted More Time So as to Have
Representatives Present.

The conference between the committee from the council and the London Electric Company, as to the basis of arbitration for the company's plant, was held yesterday afternoon in the board of trade rooms, but resulted in an adjournment pending the coming of President Matthews, of Toronto, who will take part in the next meeting.

The council was represented by Ald. Beattie, chairman, Ald. Stewart, Ald. Ferguson, Mayor Stevely, while Mr. C. B. Hunt, manager, and Mr. J. C. Judd, solicitor, appeared for the company.

The fact that the news of the conference had got out, somewhat disconcerted the committee, and there was little discussion when the press representatives were on hand.

Mr. Hunt's Position.
When the meeting was called to order, Mr. Hunt explained his position.

"We would prefer to have the president and some others of the directors at the next meeting," said Mr. Hunt. "It was impossible to get them here today, so we would ask for an adjournment until such a time as they can be on hand."

"What about Saturday at 3 o'clock?" asked Ald. Beattie.

"We could try and get them here by that time," answered Mr. Hunt.

"Would it not be better to allow Mr. Hunt to communicate with the directors and set a time for the meeting?" suggested Ald. Ferguson. "We could be easily got together. I think that would be the better way of doing things."

This suggestion was acceptable, and the gathering adjourned to meet at the convenience of the Toronto people.

As to Terms.
Nothing was said as to the terms of the arbitration, all of which will come up at the next meeting.

There is no doubt that the company will insist that the arbitration be based on the present standing of the company as a going, dividend-paying concern, and not as to whether any or all of the machinery is of use to the city for its new plant.

**BRYAN IS READY
TO RUN ONCE MORE**

EGYPT A RICH FIELD FOR THE BIBLE STUDENT

Prof. Banks' Fourth Lecture Interested a Large Audience
Last Night.

"Egyptian Excavations and the Bible" was the theme of Prof. Banks' fourth address at the Auditorium last night. The interest which the lectures are arousing is evidenced by the increasing number of persons attending. "Until some few years ago," said the lecturer, "it was thought that Egypt had given very little to the Bible student. But later excavations had produced a great deal of corroborative evidence that proved conclusively the truth of the Bible. The story of the journey of the children of Israel in the land of Egypt."

"Egypt is the gift of the Nile. Every lecturer on Egypt opens with this phrase, and nothing truer could be said, for without the Nile there would be no Egypt. The country proper extends from the mouth of the Nile for 700 miles along its banks, and is practically bounded east and west by the valley of the Nile, a strip of country ten miles wide."

The lecturer started with Cairo, and showed a number of very beautiful views of this, the largest and most modern city in Egypt, yet even here he pointed out, were traces of an older civilization, for outside the walls were the mud huts of the poorer classes, and the exact counterpart of the huts that were used when the Israelites were slaves in Egypt.

There is a general impression that the Egyptians were the original inhabitants of the country. But archaeologists have proved beyond a doubt that there was a civilization on the banks of the Nile ten thousand years ago. These people have been called Libians, and they were a tall and swarthy people. Statues that remain from the time of the ancient Egyptians show the same characteristics as those found in the ruins of ancient Babylonia, from which fact students have come to believe that the Egyptians, who superseded the Libians, were originally of Babylonian extraction.

Egyptian Hieroglyphics.
The ancient Egyptian hieroglyphics were a closed book to the world till 1749, the famous Rosetta stone, which is now preserved in the British Museum, was found. On it were found inscriptions in three different characters—first the ancient hieroglyphics, second a rude adaptation of the hieroglyphics called the Demotic inscriptions, and beneath this again the same words in Greek. So by a diligent comparison of the three texts, the meaning of the old Egyptian inscriptions was at last discovered, and the history of ancient Egypt was plain to the world. The excavations in the tombs and buried cities of Egypt have done much to verify the old records. There were those who said that the record of a king of Egypt named Menes, who was supposed to have lived 6,000 years ago, was merely a myth. But Dr. Petrie, of the Egyptian exploration expedition, finally put all doubts at rest by the discovery of the mummy of King Menes.

A Queer Belief.
It was believed among these people that a body had several souls, and that one of these souls would ultimately come back to inhabit the body, and this was the reason that they took such pains to preserve the bodies of their dead. Passing on, the lecturer spoke of Tell El-Amarna, where only a few years ago there was found such a mass of literature written on bricks, that there was no Land of Goshen, and that the story of the Israelites' sojourn in Egypt was only a myth, but some time ago an inscription was found in one of the buried temples that spoke of the land as the Land of Goshen. In some of the old buildings, too, there can be found evidence of the truth of the story of the making of bricks. At the top are bricks made of Nile mud without any other material; a little later the mud was mixed with straw, and the bricks were made of mud and straw, just as the Bible story has it. When the explorers were searching for the bodies of the kings of Egypt, the body of Ramesses II., the Pharaoh of the Exodus, was the only one that was missing, and later it was found in a sepulchre in the Land of Goshen on the shores of the Red Sea, which seems also to speak of the truthfulness of the Bible story with regard to the passage of the Red Sea.

HARRIMAN TO TOUR

Doctors Say Railway King Must Take
Real Rest.

New York, April 21.—E. H. Harriman is planning a trip abroad. Unless his ideas change meanwhile he will start early in June and make a tour of at least three months. The trip has been recommended by his physicians, and their recommendation has been endorsed by Mr. Harriman's associates in Wall street who have had visible evidence in the last year that his health was not good.

When Mr. Harriman returned from his long trip through the south into Mexico, up the Pacific Coast and back across the continent, various reports in regard to his health came from various cities. Since his return he has been in his downtown office in the Equitable Building three times. The last time was yesterday, when he attended an executive committee meeting of the Union Pacific. The other occasions have been executive committee meetings of either Union Pacific or Southern Pacific. On other days he had either remained at home or has attended a meeting of New York Central Lake Shore or Michigan Central directors at the Grand Central station.

Mr. Harriman has several of his assistants preparing a route for his trip abroad. He has been abroad before, but to Europe only once, and just as Kruttschnitt or Stubb maps out a journey for him in this country he is going to have every provision made for his arrival and departure from every railroad centre or other terminal of either steam road, trolley road or highway arranged beforehand.

MORAL RIGHT TO SLAY

Talesmen in Hains' Case Say Killing
of Annis Was Justified.

Flushing, L. I., April 21.—A special panel of 150 talesmen was exhausted today with getting an additional juror in the trial of Captain Peter C. Hains, Jun., for the murder of William E. Annis. Seven talesmen were examined. Practically all of them had developed such opinions in regard to the case that Justice Garretson excused them from the trial.

Several of the prospective jurors expressed the opinion that they could not conscientiously vote to convict the defendant as they believed that he was morally right in killing Annis if the latter had invaded the home of Captain Hains and had been guilty of wrongful relations with his wife. A number declared that there was a higher law governing such cases than the state law.

After three days there are but five men in the jury box.

Dr. A. A. Coombs, an insanity expert retained by the prosecution, was in court today. He said that the defendant was observing him closely during the proceedings.

The prisoner will maintain the same stolid indifference to his surroundings.

UNCLE SAM'S FINISH

Rev. Mr. Aled, Says American Nation
is Topping and Will Vanish.

New York, April 21.—"Can this republic endure? No government of this nature has lasted—why should this?"

That the American republic is nearing its end and that it is destined to topple and crumble to pieces as other important republics of the past have vanished, is the suggestion from an important pulpit that has startled all of Gotham and started a wave of excitement throughout the country. The Rev. Dr. Charles F. Aled, pastor of the rich Fifth Avenue Baptist Church, and commonly referred to as "John D. Rockefeller's preacher," is the churchman who has arisen as a prophet of evil. His banes cry was uttered from his pulpit during a vigorous address.

"What is there in our constitutional system," asked Dr. Aled in his sermon, "that will enable us to endure abroad by a demagogue drunk with power and dressed in a little brief authority? What reason have you for believing this republic will endure? Fifty years ago there were thoughtful minds questioning whether the republic can endure. No government of this nature has lasted—why should this?"

"A state rests on force, some say. It rests on nothing of the kind. Rome had force, and it fell. The republics were more widespread than any we have known of. Yet it did not last. If you do not believe these were the conditions of the republic will endure, look at the condition of modern Europe. Sir Edward Grey, the British minister of foreign affairs, has said that the nations of the continent were spending more than half of their revenues for navies and armies. If this rate of expenditure will endure, the civilized world would be submerged."

HEAVY PUNISHMENT FOR NEGRO WHIPPERS

Kentucky Night-Riders Fined \$25,000
Each for Whittapping.

Paducah, Ky., April 21.—No defence was offered in the federal court today to the suits of Lee Baker and Nat Frizell, negroes, for damages on account of the Birmingham night-rider raid, and the full amount, \$25,000 each, was awarded. They were driven out of Birmingham by the raiders on March 9, 1908, after being whipped, until, according to the testimony of Dr. Robert Overby, the lash cut into the muscles of their legs.

In his charge Judge Evans said the only evidence of shame for the deed manifested by the defendants was their failure to appear and deny the charge. He told the jurors it was their duty to bring a verdict not alone to cover the actual damages, but vindictive damages to any amount not exceeding \$25,000. He added that he would be surprised and chagrined if verdicts for flimsy amounts were returned.

Otis Black, the confessed night-rider, on whose testimony Dr. E. Champion and John Jackson were convicted at Benton, told of the raid and identified the defendants. He was corroborated by Arthur Griffin, who said Dr. E. Champion, the leader, made him accompany the party. Baker and Frizell told their stories, and Dr. Robert Overby, who himself was warned out of Birmingham for dressing the negroes' wounds, also testified.

On this raid J. J. Scroggs, an aged negro, and his daughter's infant child were killed with bullets. The Scroggs family, which also brought suit, is quarantined in Metropolis, Ill., with smallpox, and their cases were continued.

CANADIANS HIT BACK

American Grain Carriers Break Agreement
and Stir Up Trouble.

Toronto, April 21.—"It is reported that American vessels are contracting for grain at Port William for Buffalo without the clause limiting their liability to half a bushel per thousand. This will divert trade from Canadian ports and should be met by Canadian vessels."

Desbarats, deputy minister of marine, to Mr. Francis King, counsel for the Marine Association, caused some excitement, and a warm discussion at today's meeting of that body.
