

First Church Will Call a Pastor Meeting Called for January 21 Next

Session of Presbytery of London
—Trouble at Port Stanley.

At the afternoon session of the Presbytery of London, held in the First Presbyterian Church yesterday, the First Church asked leave to moderate in a call to a minister as soon as it is ready to do so.

This request was allowed, and a special meeting will be held in the First Church on the 21st of January, when it is expected a pastor will have been decided upon.

The resignation of Rev. W. Leitch, of Delaware, was accepted. Mr. Leitch tendered his resignation on account of ill-health, and wished to be relieved, if possible, by the end of December.

Mr. Leitch has been in the ministry for 24 years, and the last 12 of these have been spent in labors at Delaware, where his efforts have met with great success. The news that he is about to retire will cause widespread regret.

Rev. Mr. Argo was appointed moderator of the session to declare the pulpit vacant.

Rev. Dr. Ross presented a report on the settlement of vacancies, which was referred to a special committee, the meeting to be held on Jan. 21.

Complaint Made Regarding Transfers

An irate citizen came to The Advertiser office this morning and registered a real life complaint about the London street railway. He lives in the southeast end, and since the Ottawa avenue cars have been running just one way he has been put to a very great deal of inconvenience. He soon discovered that by transferring to an Oxford car at the corner of Marmion street, instead of going down town on the Ottawa avenue car, he could save five minutes or so every morning. So he transferred.

That worked all right until the other day, when the conductor of the Oxford car refused to accept the transfer, alleging that it was against his orders to do so. So the man had to pay two fares to get down town to save the five minutes, or else take the Ottawa avenue cars and take his time.

Street Railway and Ottawa Avenue

It is the intention of the London Street Railway to run cars only one way. Such was the statement of Manager King this morning to The Advertiser. He was asked the question, and admitted that such was the intention.

"We intend running them one way so long as it suffices them," he said. "Well, to ourselves and the public," he replied, "I am of the opinion that a better service, with less delay at the crossings, can be had that way, and so I asked the railway commission to install the crossing to meet my ideas. So far it has worked very satisfactory, and I have heard few complaints. I will fight this matter before Mayor Judd and several members of the council some time last summer. I think the

present plan will work out satisfactorily for all concerned." The detail has not been located as yet, but it will be installed as soon as possible, declared Manager King. "That is the worst of bylaws made by the city," declared a man prominent about the city hall this morning. "They make bylaws and they are broken on the slightest provocation. The Ottawa avenue belt is just another example."

When Mr. King laid the matter before the council his request for a one-way service was promptly refused. Thus far the company has failed to keep the agreement with the city in regard to putting in turnout on the Ottawa avenue line.

Faulty Sanitation in Two Schools

The report of Dr. Hutchinson regarding the condition of Talbot Street School is considered as very satisfactory, although not going so far as those most deeply interested would like. The ventilation of the school is bad, there is no doubt of that. The Smead-Down system of heating and ventilation is not good. The closets in the basement continue to distribute bad odors throughout the school. That was another fact established.

"The report bears out my contention," said a prominent citizen, whose children attend Talbot street school. "Trustee Graham insisted that we did not know what we were talking about but he finds out now that we were right. Conditions should be remedied, and that soon."

The condition of Lorne Avenue School is said to be as bad as that of Talbot Street, if not worse, and the bad odors throughout the school. That was another fact established.
